EDITORIAL

Morning and welcome to issue 125 of the Dronfield u3a newsletter. CLIMATE MATTERS

Where does our Burgundy bin recycling go?



Seven of our Climate Matters group recently visited the HW Martin recycling plant at Somercotes.

Once attired in hard hats and Hi-Vis vests we were given an introduction by Stacey and then shown around by Inga, who joined the company as a line picker in 2007 and is now the Site Operations Manager.

The site operates 24 hours 365 days a year, with three shifts of about 25 people - pickers, loader operators, baler operators, engineers and technicians. It is busiest in January and takes recycling from about seven local authorities and commercial contracts.

We watched from above the site floor as the materials were emptied into hoppers then through a large tumbler machine the size of a bus which breaks up glass which is separated though screens. The remainder goes up conveyor belts where further separation of materials occurs.

Articles such as card, paper, plastic milk and water bottles, as well as steel and aluminium tins are diverted to different bays. Some



are removed using camera sensors and air jets, others by magnets. In the final sorting operatives pick items manually. It was, overall, quite noisy but not too smelly.



Food residue in containers such as pizza cartons, nappies, and soft plastics such as crisp packets are a problem. These materials are ground into pellets for

incineration producing heat and energy. Mattresses are stripped down by hand and all the fillings, cloth and metals are recycled. Some jobs don't sound too pleasant!

We then went outside to look at the clean and dirty glass bays where we spotted small items such as Lego bricks, a ping pong ball, a Barbie doll's arm, AA batteries, tops of wine bottles with metal screw caps, and a disposable cigarette lighter. These items will be sent elsewhere to be recycled.

Sorted bales are sold to customers, 80% stays in the UK, and the price depends on

quality and market conditions.
Paper and card are transferred to their Leeds depot. They want to remove the word WASTE from signs as there is money to be



made when it's sold as a raw material.

We have heard that items are put in the recycling bins by parcel delivery drivers but retrieving items is not possible – apparently a wedding dress was not found despite an effort to locate it.

We found it an informative visit which made us think about putting the correct items in our bins.

The next question is what happens to our black bin waste and the large recycling skips from Stonegravels and other recycling sites?

TRAVEL ON DEMAND

Travel Derbyshire is a bookable bus service that covers the Borough of Chesterfield,
North East Derbyshire and the District of
Bolsover. It doesn't have a fixed time table and the routes it takes and its destinations are planned to suit the requirements of its passengers. For this reason journeys need to be planned and booked in advance. Bookings can be made up to seven days ahead. Early bookings will obviously be prioritised over any made on the day of travel.

The service operates Monday to Friday 7am to 7pm and on Saturday 8am to 5 pm. There is no operation on Sundays or Public Holidays. but you can use your 'Gold Card' to travel on it.

To book a seat it is a simple matter of a phone call or you can use the 'Travel Derbyshire on Demand' app. You can specify your pick up and drop off time and they will try to meet your request. You will get a text message when the bus is ten minutes away.



FESTIVALS AND CARNIVALS

My dictionary defines festivals as celebrations, merry-making, periodic musical, events and other performances of special importance. With so much gloom pervading at present our members were looking forward to an illustrated talk by Sheila and Steve Pyke, covering various European festivals and carnivals they had encountered over recent years.



At a garden festival in the Loire Valley in France, our speakers were somewhat surprised to witness teachers explaining to pupils the finer points of some

erotic exhibits. In the Netherlands they visited the incredible tulip gardens at Keukenhof. They also watched a parade consisting of twenty large floats and cars festooned with multi-coloured tulips, travelling on a route that is 40 kilometres long and takes 12 hours! One float portrayed a man, seated

in an armchair reading his paper.

In the Netherlands they visited another very popular festival named Floriade. This only takes place every ten years and each time is located in a different part of



the country, on land which is to be developed. Exhibits are on show from many other countries and when they visited it was the turn of the Russians. In 2014 a visit was made to the Spanish



city of Cordoba in May to enjoy the Patio Festival, where you can go into the gardens in domestic courtyards.

A year or so later they went to the Milan Expo. Expos

are held in a different country around the world every five years. Some of the Italian residents complained of possible corruption relating to the event but the entrance fee of about €30 was well worth it. Part of the site, once cleared, is to be the

HQ for Astra Zenica.
Over the years they have attended many Mardi
Gras carnivals in
Portugal, Madeira and
Mallorca. As well as
decorated floats there are



people in elaborate costumes, many doing synchronised dance routines. These processions can take as long as 3 hours to pass.

The fascinating talk finished with references to various English festivals such as one of the annual bonfire processions held around Lewes in East Sussex.

Nearer home in Barlow there is the annual



procession through the Main Street featuring the Red Barrows Display Team, and in the Yorkshire Dales there is the Scarecrow Festival in Kettlewell.

SCAM HOUND

Scam Hound has been out and about and detected several scams that have been trending this month.



The first is the old fake delivery scam. EVRi is the new Hermes delivery service. The scammers are sending out emails saying that you have a failed EVRi delivery and need to reschedule a delivery. Don't click on either the 'Reschedule delivery' or the 'Open here' tracking button. They will take you to the scammers website where they can steal your bank details. (THINK! Were you really expecting a delivery?)

Another scam doing the rounds is a fake McAfee impersonation email. McAfee sell antivirus protection for your computer. The fake email claims to be an 'URGENT REMINDER' that your internet protection is about to expire and you will lose your antivirus protection if you don't renew immediately. Again clicking on the button will take you to the scammers web site so you can give them your bank details. If you don't use McAfee ignoring this is no problem. If you do, check your renewal date and if necessary contact them directly.

There is also an ITVX offer doing the rounds you definitely can afford to miss. It is offering an ITV X streaming service for a subscription of only £2 a year! It's a limited offer and best to avoid if you wish to keep your bank details safe.

Finally, beware of the advert saying Lidl broke its contract with SMEG and is having to sell off its stock of SMEG kettles, worth £130, for the special price of £3 with free shipping! It's a scam! If it looks too good to be true it probably isn't true.

THE SPAGHETTI HARVEST

In 1957 the current-affairs programme Panorama, ran a special report from the canton of Ticino in southern Switzerland. The report was voiced over by the respected broadcaster Richard Dimbleby and showed a family harvesting spaghetti from the family "spaghetti tree".

They were gathering a bumper harvest after a mild winter and the virtual disappearance of the, spaghetti weevil" it was claimed. Footage of a traditional "Harvest Festival" was aired along with a discussion of the breeding programme necessary to develop a strain that would produce the perfect length of spaghetti.

At the time spaghetti was relatively unknown in the UK. Many people were unaware that it is made from wheat flour and water. It was not an everyday food and it was known mainly because of tinned spaghetti in tomato sauce. At the time, this was considered by many to be an exotic delicacy.

An estimated eight million people watched the programme when it was broadcast on 1 April 1957, and hundreds phoned in the following day to question the authenticity of the story or ask for more information about spaghetti cultivation and how they could grow their own spaghetti trees. The BBC told the latter to "place a sprig of spaghetti in a tin of tomato sauce and hope for the best".

The 'April Fool' was set up by the Panorama cameraman Charles de Jaeger who dreamed it up after remembering how teachers at his school in Austria teased his classmates for being so stupid that if they were told that spaghetti grew on trees they would believe it. Richard Dimbleby's voice over gave the three minute hoax authenticity.

The main scenes were filmed at the (now closed) Pasta Foods factory on London Road, St Albans, in Hertfordshire and at a hotel in Canatagonia in Switzerland.

GARDEN VISITS

'The Manchester and Derby Mail and other coaches pass within a mile of the house. The scenery and the views are beautiful, the situation high and dry, the water plentiful and the drainage complete. Buxton, Chatsworth, and Matlock are within easy travelling distances.'

(The Times, 17th December 1856)

Where might this fairly local property be? The answer is Thornbridge Hall which was the location for our visit to view the gardens in March. In the 1900's the owner,



George Marples, bought the surrounding land, built cottages and as well as enlarging the existing house, landscaped the park and gardens.

We gained access via a new road created during the recent Covid period and enjoyed sustenance at the new 'Quakers Restaurant'. There are over thirteen acres of formal gardens and many of the statues and fountains were installed around 1930 when the then owner, Charles Boot, head of the



Sheffield based building firm, removed artifacts from the large derelict house in Clumber Park. Walking through a stone tunnel we admired the immaculate Italian

Garden with its clipped border hedges enclosing high Juniper trees.

Walking downwards some members enjoyed the sun whilst sitting on conveniently placed seats. Here we could chat with a gardener who was strimming the tops of dead reeds beside the Koi

Lake. A few plucky members crossed a narrow, single stone, bridge which had no handrail, to access the Cascade Garden, recently renovated. Here there was the peaceful sound of a



waterfall surrounded by Rhododendron trees with buds just ready to burst into flower.

The gardens are open daily, and they are well worth visiting to view the many plants flowering through the different seasons. Our April visit is to the Renishaw Hall, well known for their formally laid out gardens. The Camellias will hopefully, be in full bloom.
