May's Monthly Meeting

Dumfries's Forgotten Statesman

Robert Threshie Reid became the Member of Parliament for Dumfries Burghs in 1886, having previously been an MP for Hereford. He was born in Corfu in 1846 and died in Kent in 1923, but there is no biography of him and he refused to retain any of his papers - "I never keep them," he said. Yet he was a member of the Liberal Government that introduced reforms which became the foundation of the British welfare state - such as old age pensions and national insurance - and he occupied one of the most powerful positions in the British government, that of Lord Chancellor. Reid's father was Chief Justice in Corfu, which was a British protectorate at the time, and Reid was educated at Cheltenham and Oxford University, where he was a successful sportsman as well as scholar. He studied law and became a QC in 1882. Politically, he was an 'advanced Liberal', favouring Irish Home Rule, and was briefly Solicitor-General and Attorney-General in the Liberal Government in 1894-5, helping to pilot the 1895 budget, which introduced death duties, through Parliament.

He was amongst those Liberals who opposed the Boer War and the aggressive actions of the British during that war, and thus became close to Campbell-Bannerman, who appointed him Lord Chancellor as a counter-balance in his Cabinet to right-wing Liberals like Asquith and Edward Grey. However, he faced a huge Tory majority in the House of Lords, which blocked many Liberal reforms, and his position in the Cabinet was diminished after Campbell-Bannerman's death in 1908, when Asquith became Prime Minister. Loreburn's opposition to Grey's foreign policy of secret alliances also estranged him from the Liberal leadership. He resigned because of ill-health in 1912, but published *How the War Came*, a book repudiating Grey's foreign policy.

Loreburn died in Kent in November 1923 and was buried in a relatively modest grave in the churchyard at Mouswald.

Slot Car Racing - An Open Day

Despite an initial setback, Antony Hawkes remains keen to set up a u3a Slot Car Racing group and has arranged an open day for Thursday 16th May from 2pm to 5pm at the YMCA building in the former Lochside Primary School. All u3a members are invited. Below we repeat the piece, written by Antony, that featured in our February newsletter.

Many people may be familiar with the principles of slot-car racing through the popular pastime known as 'Scalextric', developed in the 1950s.

Slot-car racing takes place in a number of different classes – saloon, formula 1, etc, and is usually run over a set time, eg three minutes. The race control and lap counting is computerised, and the track – hand-built out of wood – is 95 feet long with four lanes.

Drivers stand on a raised dais to drive and, when not driving, are expected to stand at the track corners to assist the marshalling of cars, that is, putting them back on the track, in the slot, if they fall off, which they do! The lanes are colour-coded to facilitate this.

The Dumfries Slot Car Club was founded in March 2023 by Ant Hawkes, a slot racer since 1968 and national champion at various levels. The location at the YMCA building in the former Lochside Primary School is a very fortunate pairing of a great space with a great sport. As part of u3a Dumfries, the group hopes to meet on the 3rd Thursday of each month.

Please note the Club provides all the cars and controls for use during slot car sessions. There is no obligation on anyone's part to invest in these items. Just bring yourself and an open mind!
