Charity Number SC021683 October 2023 Newsletter 30th Anniversary Trip to Kirkcudbright

About fifty members of u3a Dumfries made the coach trip to the Kirkcudbright Galleries on September 7th to see two of the temporary exhibitions at the gallery – *Eardley Explored: The Art of Joan Eardley (with photography by Audrey Walker)* in Gallery Two; and *Sandstone Steps*, in the Mitchell Gallery, a transatlantic collaboration between Hugh Bryden of Roncadora Press of Dumfries and Maddy Rosenberg of Central Booking in New York.

Eardley Explored presented oil paintings by the late Scottish artist, Joan Eardley, intermixed with photographs of the artist at work by

photographer Audrey Walker. Several of the paintings were of children in the poorer communities of Glasgow, painted when Eardley had a studio there in the late 1940s and again in the early 1960s, but there were also examples of the work she did based in rural and coastal Scotland – in and around the village of Catterline in Aberdeenshire. Joan Eardley died in August 1963.

The Sandstone Steps project developed from the idea of following the nineteenth- and twentieth-century journeys across the Atlantic by sandstone from the quarries around Dumfries, which helped to create the splendid architecture of New York and New York State, as in the 'Million Dollar Staircase' in the city of Albany.

Hugh Bryden and Maddy Rosenberg were both on hand to explain their collaboration, mainly developed through the creation of artists' books in the form of 'sculptural boxes, incorporating visual art, poetry and music'.

The trip concluded with afternoon tea at the Arden House Hotel in Kirkcudbright and the return home to Dumfries.

Garden Group - What We Got Up To in 2023

Mary Waugh writes about this year's Garden Group activities.

Looking out on a wet and windswept September scene, my thoughts immediately migrated to calmer and drier times earlier, featuring memorable garden visits

Our calendar of visits started in April on home ground with a visit to Crichton Rock garden. Guided by the head gardener, we left with more of an insight into the thinking behind this often ignored gem on our doorstep.

May took us beyond Moffat to Craigieburn House on the Selkirk road. The five acre garden there offers a colourful Himalayan approach. Some of the background to it was explained by the head gardener who shared some stories with us. This was an enthralling visit, whetting our appetite for our next garden.

Our visit in June to Dunscore featured three very different approaches to gardening. Starting with two gardens near the Dalgonar Bridge. The first, at Springvale, looks onto the River Cairn and takes advantage of this location in an imaginative and innovative way. This was followed by a visit to the next door neighbours at Riggfoot, whose more extensive garden also overlooks the river but is more bohemian in approach. In contrast to this, Cats Craig at Dunscore oozes a traditionally-presented well-maintained order. The wide range of plants, flowers and shrubs thrive here despite a relatively exposed location.

The experience of visiting two neighbouring gardens was repeated in July with two gardens at Stockarton, near Kirkcudbright. The first one, Stockarton, features a collection of shrubs and small trees as well as a small loch. Its neighbour, the Waterhouse Garden, is a cottage-style garden which is densely planted and terraced. Both were very worthwhile visits.

August took the group to Gatelawbridge, Thornhill, where the featured gardens, Highland Cottage and Stables Cottage were impressive for different reasons. The former showed the art of gardening in a well-planned cottage garden, whilst the latter, which featured herbaceous borders, a pond and a woodland walk, impressed with its variety and scale.

Taking advantage of the early September sunshine, the visit to Clonyard Farm was a delight for all who were there. This location features a full range of informal gardens, woodland walks, two lochs and a crannog.

The year is rounded off with a visit to the formal garden at Craichlaw, Kirkcowan, in October, a talk at Threave Gardens in November, and, of course, our year-end lunch in December.
