Past Monthly Meeting "Idioms of the English Language" – Wednesday 2nd November

Although it was a dull afternoon weather-wise, there was a good attendance at Foakes Hall for our monthly meeting. It was not our expected speaker - Brad Aston had to cancel due to unforeseen circumstances - but his brother, Warren, who entertained us by reminding us of all the odd remarks we make during our colloquial English conversations.

Who knew that way back in 1428 in London, when the guilds were queuing up in order of age of each guild, to take part in the Lord Mayor's procession, they couldn't remember who went 6th and 7th in line, so they were said to be at "sixes and sevens"? Warren had brought a selection of items to illustrate some sayings: the slapstick (yes, it is a thing), the stick for wife beating, oh no, a stick no bigger than the width of the husband's thumb! Giving us of course, "the rule of thumb".

One of Warren's explanations of an English expression was a particular favourite of my father. It began with Robert Gascoigne, a four times prime minister and the swift rise of his successor, one Arthur Balfour. Later it was revealed that Balfour was Gascoigne's nephew hence "and Bob's your uncle".

Finally, Warren explained how Lord Reith in the early days of BBC radio, 100 years ago, agreed to try a commentary on a football match to see how it would work. A picture of a football pitch was printed in the Radio Times with a numbered grid superimposed on it, so that listeners would have an idea of where the ball was on the pitch. Therefore, after every time a goal was scored the commentator said, "and return to square one".

What an entertaining talk, now we can all impress friends with our newfound knowledge.

Past Outing "Thursford" – Thursday 10th November

On a fairly nice November morning, 32 intrepid "Outings Goers" travelled to North Norfolk to the Thursford site via some rapidly narrowing lanes, arriving just a short while before official opening time for the day.

First, to the 'pit stops' for WCs and if needed a cup of tea and snack. Then straight on to the other areas. A good number headed for the catering outlets to ensure availability, before the main show at 2pm. Afterwards, it was on to the other attractions depending on personal preferences.

The main activity area, shops, souvenirs etc., was close to the Auditorium for the main show, and this meant it was, in the writer's view, too crowded to be fully enjoyed, with a continuous mass of people both entering and leaving a small central area which also gave access to the bar, and the Auditorium. This cannot have been an easy situation for the less mobile amongst us. But, nevertheless, intrepid as we all were, we found our places easily, on time, without incident to our fairly decent seating, towards the stage centre.

The show started spot on time, and thereafter it was all action! The choreography was outstanding, the activities all full of boundless energy, and a delightful compilation of music, dance and quite excellent singing.

A major theme of the interaction with the audience was the performers using the aisles to permeate throughout the entire audience, close up. It was during these elements when one could really appreciate the quality of many of the performers and singers, who were all "wired up" so that the music was spot on time. And as the show carried on, and the effects of food and the journey started to take their toll, we were jolted back to the 'here and now' by some stunning, high kicking, can-can and similar dancing. What I found astonishing was that the show was to be repeated in the evening!

The show was 3 hours long with a 25 minute interval, which meant a short time to prepare ourselves for the return journey, which started with a 10–15 minute queue on the narrow lanes, to reach the main road after which it was a trouble free journey back to Dunmow.

Sadly, we were left with 2 unsold tickets for this really first class entertainment, otherwise, this was an all round, successful outing.

Who Can Go On An Outing?

Dunmow u3a outings are run <u>by members for members</u> of Dunmow u3a.

- Occasionally guests may be able to have a place on an outing, however Dunmow u3a members have priority.
- Guests of u3a members must be eligible for u3a membership.
- Wives, husbands and partners cannot use their other half's membership to book a place and will be treated as a guest.
- Members of other u3as can go once Dunmow u3a members have had time to book their places.
- Guests of members can only go on one outing they will need to join Dunmow u3a if they wish to join further outings.
- Guest places will only be confirmed nearer the time of the outing.

Our Outings are by far the most widely supported activity in Dunmow u3a - hundreds of you have joined us for days out, theatre trips and visits to exhibitions and places of interest. 




COME AND JOIN US TO PLAY MAH-JONG!

range. It is fair to say that we were not always correct, and sometimes were far from it. So price cannot alone guarantee a high rating with our group!


