# Past Monthly Meeting "A Journey Into Print" – Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> July

Before our main speaker began, Peter Watson, u3a member and President of Dunmow Rotary club, gave a short presentation about Rotary International. Rotary's aims of peace, clean water, education, environment, supporting local economies and fighting disease have helped, for example, nearly eradicate polio worldwide.

Locally, Dunmow Rotary has seen Helena Romanes school win the Essex "Youth Speaks" competition and a local pupil achieve national 3<sup>rd</sup> place in the "Young Environmentalist" award. Dunmow Rotary club is celebrating its 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary next year and would welcome new members. It is open to all and the Dunmow Rotary club would particularly welcome more female members. Patrick Forsyth was then introduced and spoke about his "Journey into Print", punctuating his presentation with several interesting and often amusing extracts from his various travel books. He originally wrote management training books but decided to move into travel writing after his daughter encouraged him to write "a proper book". He sought advice from publications such as "74 reasons why your book will never be published and 14 reasons why it just might" as well as joining a writing group. He also entered a newspaper writing competition and, with the prize money, paid for a place on a writing course.

His advice for those with an idea was to be persistent and chase potential publishers who don't reply; research a publisher's speciality and processes, and make sure to submit ideas of the correct length, in the right format, to the right people. Depending on your objectives, especially if you are writing your own life-story for family or friends, it may be worth considering self-publishing (either for Kindle or in hard copy). He advised us that, ultimately, writing requires dedicated BOSHOK (burn on seat, hands on keyboard) and persistence.

different parts of the town.



successfully >>>




Just for fun we have

**Garden Group** meets every fortnight during the Summer months so we have had visited three gardens since the last newsletter.

Keeway, Burnham-on-Crouch

At the end of July members visited Keeway, a large, mature garden near Burnham-on-Crouch. We had a relaxing time wandering around the flowerbeds which were full of colourful flowering perennials, including yellow Heleniums, blue and pink Veronica's and large groups of Gauras. For those who wanted to explore further there was a paddock that had been left to grow wild and which led down to a small lake. From the garden we were treated to stunning views of the River Crouch which we admired while being served delicious cakes, tea and coffee.





#### Sandy Lodge at Halstead

Our August trips started with a trip out to Emma and Rick's garden at Sandy Lodge. They moved to the house in 2011. When they arrived there was an abundance of conifers. They have now removed most to allow for a more "open" garden. At the front of the house is a delightful "bee border" inspired by Beth Chatto's gravel garden containing some beautiful grasses plus a driftwood area that is cool and calming to sit in.



The latest addition, to the rear of the house, are the long borders, planted with grasses and pops of bright colour; only planted in 2021 but already very effective. There is a large raised decked area that gives a view, over the hedges, towards the village church. This was where we were served our tea and coffee and beautiful cakes.

Beth Chatto OBE was an award-winning

plantswoman, author and lecturer, and her gardens did not disappoint. The 7.5 acre garden is split into 5 "rooms", and we wandered around



them in awe of the well chosen plants and trees, and the wildlife they attracted. It was very tranquil, especially in the water garden with its beautiful ponds. The whole garden seemed to be teeming with bees, dragonflies, butterflies, and moths, almost everywhere you looked.

After a light lunch we all seemed to gravitate to

the nursery where there were many plants for sale, mostly grown on site.

Some of us did not leave empty handed! It was a lovely day out, with perfect weather, greatly enjoyed by us all. The garden is well worth a visit if you've never been, and is only about a 50 minute drive from Great Dunmow.

A good speaker makes a complex topic entertaining and relatable, as the **Geology group** found out when Ian Mercer from the Essex Rock and Mineral Society came to talk about 'Deep Time in Essex Walls', hosted appropriately at Stebbing church. He showed how we can read Essex's geological history by carefully



▶ observing the stones and rocks used to build our local churches which are clues to the geology hidden deep beneath our flat landscape and how they got here.

Who knew there are so many different kinds of flint, or that other materials to be found like quartz, sarsen, cementstone, chalk and granite arrived here by way of prehistoric river systems, the ice cap or

volcanic activity from other parts of Britain or further afield? Not to mention the differences between stones, pebbles, cobbles, rocks and boulders!

We then put it all into practice with lan enthusiastically guiding us around the church walls to show 'hands on' how to interpret what we see, not least having taken the time to explain to us where Stebbing fits into Essex's geology.
