



For our final meeting of the year, the **Geology Group** was treated to a very interesting talk about plate tectonics by retired exploration geologist David Crisp.

The group learnt how plate tectonic movements have been behind some fairly recent catastrophic natural disasters, such as the Mount St Helens eruption of 1980, the Boxing Day Tsunami in the Indian Ocean in 2004 and the more recent earthquakes in Turkey.

David explained how the Earth's outermost layers are divided into major and minor tectonic plates and that it is the jostling of these plates against

each other that has caused many geological events including earthquakes, volcanic eruptions and the creation of mountains.

David also gave us an insight into his career as an exploration geologist and how his knowledge of plate tectonics helped him in his search for minerals and metals.

A compact Science Group advance party sounded out Chelmsford Science & Engineering Society's programme at Anglia Ruskin University. The December's talk was by Bob Richardson of the local REMAP branch – Rehabilitation Engineering Movement Advisory Panels – or otherwise 'Retired Engineers Make Anything Possible'!

Bob focused on improvising electronic devices for assisted living for the differently-abled, responding to local client needs through referrals. Intriguing examples were explained, including a laser guided walking stick for Parkinsons sufferers, a robot gripper for wheelchair users and a gaming console for those unable to operate a smartphone keypad. Some find their way into care homes.

There are seventy self-funded groups across the UK, three in Essex. Work is non-commercial and free of charge.

Laser Walking Sticks

Switch triggered laser writes a line in front of the client. For Around 50% of Parkinson's Patients it helps them overcome the "freezing" that can be a symptom of the condition. Initial units used a red laser but switched to green when they became available. Lent to several clients to see if they work for them before they purchase a professional unit (£200 to £300). Donated to some clients.



Remote grabber. Young Lady in a wheelchair if she dropped a pencil or similar small object was able to pick it up with this grabber. Powered from an accessory socket on her wheel chair. Grabber based on a MakeBlock Robot grippers with an current limited controller built into the small box that also houses a centre off 2 way switch to select grip and release



In November, members of the Family History group enjoyed a fascinating visit to the London Metropolitan Archives in London. The LMA is a public archive that holds over 3 million documents, photographs, maps, films and artefacts of London's history from 1067 to today.

The group enjoyed a presentation about the LMA and its role recording not only the key events in the capital, but also the social history of its inhabitants. The presentation also gave us insights into how to use advanced search techniques to get the most from the records.

The group was then privileged to have a behind the scenes tour to see the conservation work and storage areas. A highlight was when our guide noticed a leather box sitting on a random trolley and opened it to discover the Great Seal of James II!

Unfortunately, the fire alarm went off shortly afterwards and we spent some time outside whilst the alert was investigated; fortunately it was nothing serious.

We then spent the rest of our visit carrying out our own research (with wonderful 1:1 support from LMA staff) or viewing the exhibition material.

For example, one member accessed the original log books from her grandfather's school and was fascinated to read the detailed scheme of work that he was taught nearly 125 years ago as well as the day-to-day events that he experienced in school: sports events,



visitors to assembly, outings, prize days and celebrations. The enlightened attitude to education was a real eye-opener, with an obvious determination to educate pupils beyond the basic 3Rs and to ensure that they had the skills to develop their lives.
