The group met in Durham recently on 10 August and visited a few local pubs including the historic Victoria in Hallgarth Street.



The group

meets at 12 o'clock on the second and fourth Thursday of the month and we usually have something to eat in the first pub and then slake our thirst in one or two (sometimes three) more. The group is organised under the auspices of the Northumbria Region of the U3A and most members live in and around Newcastle, South Shields, Chester le Street or Sunderland. We try to visit as many different areas as possible. Recent meetings have been held in Corbridge, Newcastle, Wylam, Gateshead, Whitley Bay, Tynemouth and Sunderland. Almost everyone uses public transport to get to and from the meetings and that is a key consideration about where we will meet.

## **Gunfight at the Raffles Hotel**

Now for another vivid and entertaining account from James Gilman, whose life stories are the very stuff of adventure...

The two men faced each other in the half light. Each drew his pistol, and fired. The first shot missed, and ricocheted into the distance. The second shot hit the wrong target. My father had shot my mother, instead of the intruder he'd aimed at.

In the 1950s Communists were invading Malaya (now called Malaysia, which at the time included the city of Singapore), with a view to taking over the country from its British rulers and making it a Communist state. With the Raffles Hotel being the most famous hotel in that part of the world, they decided to send a soldier with a homemade Communist flag to break into the hotel, climb up to the roof, lower the British Union flag flying there, and in its place fly the Communist flag. This would have been a tremendous publicity victory for the Communists had succeeded. and maior а embarrassment the British to Government.

The soldier chose to enter the hotel via the window of the bedroom in which my parents were asleep, assuming it was unoccupied. Hearing the sound of breaking glass and alarmed at the sight of a uniformed figure climbing in through the window, my father leaped out of bed and, with a tremendous roar, lunged towards his opponent with a view to capturing him. They wrestled for several minutes, each trying to overcome the other. Then the soldier. breaking free, drew his pistol and fired at my father, but the bullet went wide and vanished into the ceiling. My father, at the same time drawing his own Biretta pistol, fired at the soldier, but the bullet missed and instead struck the bed in which my mother lay, watching in horror the scene before her. Amazingly, the bullet passed between her closed legs, scorching the skin, then went right through the bed and lodged in the floor below.

The soldier managed to break free, and fled into the hotel grounds and out of sight. However, my father managed to seize his flag and his cap, both of which are displayed here. The Communists never did succeed in taking over Malaya, which later became an independent nation, minus the city of Singapore, under its present name of Malaysia.

In 1988 I stayed at the Raffles Hotel en route to Indonesia, and found that the Chinese doorman on duty had been there on the night the soldier tried to break in, and remembered the occasion. I invited him to join me in my room that evening and we noisily celebrated 'the old days', accompanied by much consumption of the hotel's own unique alcoholic drink: the Singapore Sling!
