

UPDATE ON National U3A from your Chairman

If you have been reading your monthly magazine, and particularly the current copy, you will have seen the 'furore' (my word, not theirs!) that developed over and during the AGM this year. As a result a series of meetings over zoom is taking place around the UK to explain the issues (finally!) and listen to the members. I attended one of these (3 hours, that required 3 coffees and cake) last week, and I will attempt to give you a summary because we do need to understand where all this is coming from., and possibly leading to.

Interestingly, as you probably know, Eric Midwinter helped to set up our national u3a some 40 years ago, and he says if he was setting it up today, it would not be organised in the same way or with the same structure.....

Why is change needed?

Governance (and by this we mean the Charities' Commission requirements) is now more complex, and over the years, our members' expectations have changed.

Not easy to select volunteer u3a members to serve when different skills are required - on the one part because of the governance required in being a Charity , and on the other, dealing with day to day u3a matters.

There has been too little focus recently on 'real' u3a matters (the things that concern you and me) which has meant that our Regional reps are currently pulled in different ways.

Key ideas for the future

A new "u3a Council" which would be the principal and effective focal point for the voice of the membership.

A new smaller "u3a Board" (different to Council) focused on compliance and governance (legal, financial and Charity commission compliance; creating and monitoring strategy).

A new Board election process – to ensure appointees with correct core skills.

(Obviously new protocols and working arrangements would be needed to ensure clarity of roles between the u3a Board and the u3a Council and full accountability)

Summary

If introduced...

U3a-related matters would have constant attention in a u3a Council – all initiatives would have a u3a impact assessment;

A small u3a Board with elected, skilled input, would reassure members that compliance requirements are being met including sound financial plans being in place;


A representative u3a Council would reduce workload for regional reps and introduce clarity;

More u3a members will be expected to contribute, but no increase in staffing levels.

The meeting was assured that such alterations would not lead to increased cost to members.

An interview with Geoff Wiggins.....

Hello Geoff, you have now joined the committee so I think that it's high time members know a little more about you! When did you join Ems Valley U3A?

I can't remember exactly but probably 2011.

How did you originally find out about us?



Funnily enough, you and Diana were our introduction to the U3A. We had heard about the Emsworth St Aubin Twinning somehow or other and we went along to a get together one evening, not knowing anybody of course and you both said "right, you are on our table". We then had a good chat during the evening and you told us about the U3A, thus we promptly joined.

How has membership of our U3A affected your life?

We are naturally gregarious people and obviously wanted to expand our social circle here. We did know a couple of people in

Emsworth, oddly both in our road, although neither in the U3A. Joining Ems Valley has given us a marvellous introduction to many people whom we are now glad to call our friends. We don't have many blank days on the calendar!

Did you come to Emsworth when you retired? Can you tell us a little about your life elsewhere?

I bought our house the year before I retired, rented it out for that year and then moved here in May 2010 and spent nearly a year rebuilding, double glazing, rewiring, decorating and so on.

When thinking about where to live after retirement, I didn't have any firm idea as long as we were near the sea. Katie's mother used to live in Havant and she knew the area. Other members of her family are nearby and my family likewise not too far away, so Emsworth it was. I was born in St Stephen's hospital in Chelsea, now the Kensington and Westminster hospital (incidentally where my parents met) and where my father was a Consultant Anaesthetist. Easy, Red. I do have a preference for French reds, however South American reds are very much to the fore these days and a good Malbec is hard to beat.



Model Railway Group Meeting 14th October 2022

It was good to welcome John to the October meeting of the Model Railway Group, especially as he takes a good photo, albeit that he was not into selfies on this occasion!

Four of us met at Les, our leader's house, and were shown how trees could be made to add to the scenic effects of layouts. Numerous model trees are available commercially, but a cheaper, more satisfying, and probably more realistic result can be achieved by making your own.



Examples were shown using two materials - dried sea moss and dried buddleia flowers from the garden. Different colours and effects can be achieved using spray or brushed paint and other effects achieved by the addition of some



adhesive and coloured flock, all relatively simple and cheap to do. Simple technology can also be employed to create realistic lawns or fields of grass or straw by using "static grass". This is accomplished by shaking man-made fibre strands through a metal sieve connected to a power supply. This causes the fibres to stand upright when landing on an adhesive coated surface, and creates your lawn or field.

Impressive tree examples and fields used for real we then saw when we adopted our engine driver or fat controller roles on Les's layout. A timetable had been devised by Les and, after a brief teach-in, we were let loose on his extensive layout

which has been built up over many years.

Locomotives are all digitally controlled so three of us were responsible for their trains following the timetable, whilst I, as the fat controller, did my best to ensure that the "roads" (all the points) were set, in order for them to safely do so. Several shunting manoeuvres were successfully achieved, as well as operation of the turntable, before the various trains completed their allotted journeys and it was time to say farewell until the next meeting, which is scheduled for the second Friday of the month, and in fact did take place on 11th November, with more successful timetabled running.

Our member, Peter, gave a very informative talk about Pollution in Langstone and Chichester Harbours last Thursday, and gave us plenty to think about! Unfortunately the many questions and issues that members wished to raise were timed out!

The iceman cometh...

The remains of Ötzi, who's named after the Ötztal Alps where he was found, were discovered on Sept. 19, 1991 by German tourists in an Alpine pass between Italy and Austria. **Ems Valley Wine Appreciation One members**

discovered him in June 2015 in a Bolzano museum. The hikers first thought they'd found the preserved body of a modern mountaineer, but investigations later determined that Ötzi died about 5,300 years ago. According to the Secrets of the Ice website, the generally accepted story of Ötzi's death comes from investigations by archaeologist Konrad Spindler of the University of Innsbruck in Austria.

Spindler found that Ötzi had probably been murdered: an arrowhead was embedded in his shoulder, and a deep cut in his hand appeared to be a defensive wound suffered while warding off a blow. He also noted that Ötzi's backpack, bow and arrow quiver were damaged, which Spindler proposed was a sign of combat. A new study also questions the prevailing story of Ötzi's death suggesting that Ötzi did not die in the gully where he was found. Rather, his remains may have been



carried there by the periodic thawing of the ice that surrounded his body. And the new evidence now argues that the damage to Ötzi's equipment was probably caused by the pressure of the ice that surrounded them.

It is quite amazing when and where a glass of wine can lead you.....

Once again this year, I've already had many requests for my Christmas Brandy Cake recipe so here goes:

1 cup sugar, half pound butter, 1 tsp. baking powder, 1 cup water, 1 tsp. salt, 1 cup brown sugar, Lemon juice, 4 large eggs, Nuts, 1 bottle VSOP Martel Brandy, 2 cups dried fruit, I cup glace cherries, 4 cups self raising flour.

Sample a cup of the brandy to check quality. Take a large bowl, Check the Brandy again to be sure it is VSOP, then Repeat. Turn on the electric mixer. Beat one cup of butter in a large fluffy bowl.
