#### Letter from the Chairman

First of all, Happy New Year to you all and I hope you had a nice festive season.

Don't forget that our AGM this year will return to its traditional place in the calendar on Friday 17<sup>th</sup> February, which is the third Friday of the month. We were obliged by lockdowns to change the month of the meeting and we have gradually returned to February. Last year we combined the AGM with a regular monthly talk which was well received, so we plan to do the same this year. Last October Gill and I went to "u3a Explores Science" at the Royal Institution which was good. We found out about it in a small easy to miss article in the TAM magazine that many of us receive. So if you like that sort of thing, keep an eye out for it as they said they would do another this year. It really is a fantastic opportunity to enjoy this historic building which has been so important in the history of science.

Our Christmas lunch at Chichester College was a splendid affair again. The young students who looked after us did a great job and lunch was very nice. I'd like to say a big thankyou to Maureen and friends who put so much work into organising it.

Some of you might have noticed that our website, <code>emsworthu3a.org.uk</code>, has been behaving strangely. The Third Age Trust (TAT) who organise the hosting service were let down by the American hosting company, TSO Hosts, who decided that it didn't want the business and deleted all of our data. There has been much work at the TAT and in local u3as to rebuild our websites which are now hosted in the UK and that work is mostly complete now. The only remaining task is for group leaders who edit their own pages to reload their pictures and other files which could not be recovered.

This is my last letter to you as Chairman because I have served for three years and it is time to make way for another to be elected at our AGM. I've enjoyed doing it and hope I've been of some service. I'll still be around and intend to take part in more group activities. Don't forget that the committee will still need one or two additional members and that it's a great way of getting to know more people and to be "in the loop".



#### A Caribbean cruise experience

Having seen a lot about tall ships at one time or another, I became aware of a holiday that would allow me to sail on one. This was to be on the Royal Clipper, a huge ship with 5 masts, 42 sails, a sleek silhouette, a luxurious interior, 102 crew, up to 227 passengers and excellent 4 star dining. This stunning ship evokes a bygone era of traditional seafaring, but I would be able to try it without all the hardships that the crew used to endure.

We left the cold British winter weather and had a nine hour flight to Barbados where we had three days at a beach resort hotel to get over the flight, get used to the lovely warm weather and meet some of the other passengers. One of them was a repeat voyager, coming on the same cruise every year for four to six weeks, so things looked good. On the afternoon of the fourth day we transferred to the Royal Clipper, and settled into our cabins. These were to a standard reminiscent of the Titanic, totally luxurious and with very attentive staff looking after us. Later we gathered on deck for the setting sun ceremony of hoisting the sails on all the five masts. It was quite a spectacle with the atmospheric Conquest of Paradise music by Vangelis playing as all 42 sails went up, and promised a good holiday.

The cruise was organised so that we sailed overnight and anchored each day, in the harbours of Barbados, St. Lucia, Dominica, Antigua, Guadaloupe, Martinique, and back to Barbados. It was possible to swim off the stern of the ship (which I did up to 5 times a day), and the beaches on each island provided superb swimming in aquamarine warm water, gentle waves and with plenty of sea life, fish and turtles, and the facility to kayak, snorkel and sail from them. The islands provided a huge mix of cultural sites, from museums, historic forts, palm forests, botanic gardens and bustling local markets that we could visit on trip organised from the clipper. There were also lectures on various subjects each day, and evening entertainment including a Talent Night, where some of the guests put on a good show with singers, sea shanties, and a hand puppet show.
