

Our AGM will be followed immediately after by our monthly talk. We are delighted to welcome back Dr Todd Gray, who will be giving us a presentation on 'Devon and the Slave Trade'. As Todd says: "The history of Devon's involvement in African slavery can be contentious, mostly because of its legacy in race relations but also because we are still learning about it." Through previous sessions by Todd we have seen that he is most thorough in his approach, locating and reading thousands of documents from not only Devon but also from other parts of the UK. In these times of so many secondary resources it is refreshing to know that Todd's findings and analysis are from studying primary resources.

By pure chance in the early 90s Todd had a conversation with the writer Maya Angelou. She was interested in whether there were any documents relative to slavery in the local archives. Todd showed her some documents and the book developed from there. The Black History Foundation awarded his book 'Devon and the Slave Trade' 'Outstanding Contribution to Black Studies' in 2007. Todd will have his award-winning book for sale in the Pavilion. A session not to be missed.

Member Code of Conduct

Our committee recently reviewed the Member Code of Conduct. We wish to remind members about this, and here are the key points:

u3a members are expected to conduct themselves in line with the Movement's Guiding Principles. They are also expected to treat each other with dignity and respect. Specifically:

- Members are expected to know, follow and promote the principles of the u3a Movement at every opportunity.
- Members must always act in the best interests of Exmouth and District u3a and the u3a Movement, strive to uphold its reputation and never do anything which could bring their own, another u3a or the u3a Movement into disrepute or expose it to undue risk.
- Members are expected to use Exmouth and District's u3a's resources responsibly and only to further its stated charitable objects/purposes.
- Members are expected to reflect the current organisational policy of Exmouth and District u3a, regardless of whether it conflicts with their personal views.
- Members are expected to abide by Exmouth and District's u3a procedures and practices.
- Members are expected to treat each other with courtesy and respect at all times.

Group News – Bird Watching Group 2: Tuesday 19th April

We met up at Stantyway farm and were greeted by David White who kindly led our walk. He clearly has a wealth of experience of birding and also photography. Sam (the Farmer) knows and trusts David to "go off track" and has worked closely with Sam during various events, such as Countryfile's recent filming at the farm. David has a particular interest in cirl buntings, hence Sam's introduction.

The walk brought with it both interesting bird songs and of course sightings. In fact, we heard the sound of a cirl bunting way before we sighted one towards the end of the walk. Sam paused his drilling of a field sewing quinoa seed, got off his tractor and gave us an interesting talk on the history of the organic farm that he runs. The view from this field was spectacular overlooking the coastline.

Here are the birds that were spotted on today's walk and in no particular order: whitethroat, cirl bunting, wren, robin, partridge, magpie, skylark, cormorant, blue tit, wood pigeon, goldfinch, herring gull, kestrel, house sparrow, dunnock, carrion crow, rook, blackbird and buzzard.

Group News – Exploring with a Bus Pass Group: Covid Hazards

In March 2019 the Exploring with a Bus Pass group was formed starting with an initial meeting at The Pavilion to draw up the ground rules of how we should operate. Of those first gathered together two of us are still exploring. Each month we take it in turns to plan an outing using local buses to get to somewhere new, spend some time there and then return, sometimes as a group or sometimes separately. For the first year this plan worked well, going to such places as Sidmouth, Seaton, Exeter Cinema Museum, Rosemoor Gardens, Exeter Quay, Honiton and Burnaville Nurseries.

But in March 2020 Boris Johnson, the prime minister, announced a complete lock down of all unnecessary movement of the population to prevent the spread of the new virus, Covid 19. Thus, our monthly bus trips were put on hold until further notice. Undaunted, members were contacted each month just to keep in touch and as soon as we were allowed to meet outdoors and socially-distanced we met on The Strand, Exmouth for coffee and chat. Gradually, as things eased, we took the plunge and went on short journeys from Exmouth to Sandy Bay, where some of the group walked back to Exmouth along the beach, Greenfingers Garden Centre for coffee and Budleigh Salterton taking a picnic lunch. Two of us then ventured to Sidmouth, again taking a picnic lunch to have whilst going on a self-guided walk around the town. Every time we went on the bus we had to observe the current Covid regulations which initially were rather antisocial – only one person to a seat on the bus not to mention the obligatory wearing of a face mask.

Membership of the group has come and gone and now there is a waiting list to join despite the restrictions – Covid hasn't put people off! New friends have been made, lots of laughter, new experiences and new places visited. Usually, after arriving at our destination we arrange to meet for lunch at an agreeable café, meanwhile small groups split off to explore before or after lunch. We don't necessarily all return to Exmouth together. Now that most restrictions have been lifted we are venturing much further afield with trips to Totnes, Seaton Tramway and Moreton Hampstead envisaged.



On a recent outing to Torquay, going via Dawlish and Teignmouth and returning via Newton Abbot, we encountered the knock-on effects of staff problems caused by Covid. All went well until our return journey. En route the views across Lyme Bay seen from the Teignmouth to Torquay bus were spectacular. On arrival we found an excellent independent café for lunch before heading off to the bus stop for the return journey.



The bus for Newton Abbot arrived but there was no driver to take us to Newton Abbot causing us to wait for the next bus (about 10 minutes later) which resulted in missing our connection to Exeter. This meant a wait of nearly an hour so a cup of tea in the indoor market filled the time. On returning to the bus stop we were told that our bus to Exeter via Kingsteignton would not be running but to get another bus to Exeter via Bovey Tracey – at least it was a more scenic route. When this bus arrived at Matford P & R, Exeter there were more driver problems and luckily a driver volunteered to take us to Exeter. On talking to another driver, who was hitching a ride to the bus station, we learned that over 150 Stagecoach staff, about a quarter of the workforce, were sick or had left the service for better paid work. He also said that in the thirty years he had worked for Stagecoach he had never known such staff shortages.

We duly get to Countess Wear to make our connection to Exmouth and after a bit of a wait we get the 57 bus back to Exmouth. But this is not the end of the story. Whilst on the bus several other people got on complaining that they had been waiting an hour for the 57 bus to arrive. There are notices on the buses now asking passengers to be kind and considerate to the drivers because of the staff shortages so as we alighted we made a point of thanking the drivers. Despite all these knock-on effects of the pandemic making our day out longer than planned, we had the camaraderie of being in a group which made it all so much more enjoyable. Let's hope future outings will be less fraught with driver shortages.

Review of 'Devon Historical and Hysterical' by Maggie Duffy – Exmouth Pavilion, 7th April 2022



Throughout a wonderful mix of songs, stories and poems it was very clear that Maggie had gained inspiration from Devon's rich heritage of folk lore and legend. She admitted that she wasn't a star pupil of history at school, however it was certainly evident that Maggie had an ear for a good story. Maggie entertained us with many local tales which she incorporated into her work ensuring that oral history was recorded and shared with us; so essentially a 'true' historian.

Her knowledge of life in Brixham past and present came to the fore in a number of her pieces. 'Brixham Belle' written by Maggie was one example of the story behind a building which became known as - 'Ye Olde Coffin House' centring on the tale of a father who said he would rather see his daughter in a coffin than wed a certain Captain Roundsell. We learnt about the very unusual coffin shape of this 18th century building in King Street built by Captain Roundsell as a marital home to annoy the father; he did in fact wed the daughter.

Maggie's rendition of a number of humorous poems were warmly received by our u3a audience who enjoyed the well-

spoken words, with the emphasis just right. It was so good to hear the laughter from a very appreciative audience.

Maggie captured and maintained our interest with many incredible tales one such being a stormy night in January 1917 when the Devon fishing village of Hallsands collapsed into the sea. The entire village was destroyed together with the livelihoods of its people. For decades the fishing village of Hallsands and its stunning coastline had been at the mercy of the forces of nature and although the storm played its part in destroying the villager's homes it was most likely due to greed and deception. An engineering company had secured the rights to dredge shingle from along the coast from Hallsands to Beesands without any consultation with the villagers and the dredging altered the landscape and in essence destroyed the resident's homes. Fortunately all the residents survived but many homes were lost



and Maggie's evocative rendition of her 'Hallsands' was exquisite and set the mood for this dramatic song.

Overall we were treated to a magical session; beautiful singing, well told stories and poems and lovely guitar playing. A fantastic vocalist devoted to her craft. Thank you Maggie!

We welcome Maggie back for 'Pot Pourri' on Thursday 13th April 2023 .

'Everything you Need to Know About Scams': Zoom presentation on Thursday 28th April

Scammers are always coming up with new ways to defraud us, so you can never be too careful. Many people are still taken in by different scams – as soon as you get wise to one sort, a new type pops up. It is estimated that around **£10 billion** is lost each year in the UK by victims of scams.

Some of you may remember that we had a session on scams in February 2020 in Budleigh Town Hall (just before the first lockdown). I thought it would be timely to follow this up and on 28 April I shared on Zoom a presentation from the National Neighbourhood Watch movement about scams and the different types:

- Doorstep crimes and rogue traders
- Postal scams
- Telephone scams
- Investment & pension scams
- Online fraud
- Email scams
- Romance scams

THE LITTLE BOOK OF BIG SCAMS

We learnt how to spot to spot them, some top tips, how to report them and how to protect yourself and your community from becoming a victim.

Some good advice is the **'Take Five to Stop Fraud' campaign** (<u>https://www.ourwatch.org.uk/crime-prevention/crime-types/scams/protecting-against-scams</u>). Criminals are experts at impersonating people, organisations and the police. They spend hours researching you for their scams, hoping you'll let your guard down for just a moment. **Stop and think**. It could protect you and your money.

- STOP: Taking a moment to stop and think before parting with your money or information
- CHALLENGE: Could it be fake? It's ok to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush you.
- **PROTECT:** Contact your bank immediately if you think you've fallen for a scam and report it to Action Fraud.
