We had the chance to look at some photos and videos taken then, plus the chance to reflect on 10 special events throughout the year at a further 10th anniversary event: our celebration on Zoom of both our own anniversary and also the national u3a 40th anniversary in national u3a week on 22 September. Since our last AGM in May I have mentioned in these newsletters and on the stage in the Pavilion that in May 2023 I will be stepping down as Chair as will lan McLauchlin, our Secretary. Also stepping down from the committee will be John Hunt, our Newsletter Editor. We are announcing this in good time as we want to ensure a smooth handover for our wonderful u3a. The three of us had all felt that we had gained so much from belonging to our u3a that we wanted to give something back. So we joined the committee in 2018, 2019 and 2020 respectively and have contributed in different ways as part of a team, learnt a great deal along the way, and have seen many of you stepping forward as volunteers to make our u3a the success that it is. To ensure that we fill these key officer positions of Chair and Secretary and also the committee position of Newsletter Editor we would ask you to seriously consider joining our committee. 

'Devon Suffrage Activists and What They Did Next' A talk by Dr Julia Neville – 8th September 2022



The fight for equality for women in Britain took place over many decades and indeed both here and throughout the world still continues. Dr Julia Neville is a community historian who, with others, works on local histories, designed to ensure the role of women in those stories is given due weight.

During 2017 and 2018 research was carried out into the role of the Women's Suffrage movement in Devon, to celebrate the 1918 Representation of the People Act, which gave the vote to some, not all, women, and with greater restrictions than men. Dr Neville gave us a clear chronological account of the movement at the end of the 19th century and the beginning of the 20th, using a series of slides of posters, photos, drawings and other documentary evidence.


In Devon the early pioneers used organisations like the Women's Liberal Association and the Women's Local Government Society to host meetings and invite speakers to propose the extension of the vote to women. Four of these pioneers were Exmouth women: Mary Pinkney, Ethel Phear, Florence Stuart and Adelaide Montgomery. The first dedicated suffrage society to have a Devon presence was the WSPU (Women's Social and Political Union) advocating "Deeds not Words". Later, the less militant NUWSS (National Union of

Women's Suffrage Societies) predominated. Local action included the Exeter hunger strike, a pilgrimage of supporters on foot all round Devon, ending in Exeter and by train to the 1913 Hyde Park rally, spoilt census papers and tax resistance.

Dr Neville's talk made that period of history very clear but also left a lot to consider. Would the vote have come sooner if politicians had not been more concerned about, for example, the Irish question? Would it have come sooner if some supporters had not been put off by the militant action? There is, however, no doubt that women established their equality by their role in WW1, leading at that point to the vote, albeit restricted.

The talk ended with a glimpse of the lives of those Devon women who were activists, many being teachers, doctors, some retiring from public life. Many were involved in wider education for the working classes, such as WEA or the Cooperative Women's Guild.

Overall, a lot was learned about the Suffrage movement as well as local involvement. Very many thanks to Dr Neville for this excellent talk.
