## Review of Steve King's 'The Music of the Sixties 1960 - 1964' 27th May 2021

From time to time we were taken across the pond. Elvis Presley of course 'It's now or never'; the best-selling single by Presley, and one of the best-selling singles of all time. The Everly Brothers with 'Cathy's Clown' and their close harmony singing. Roy Orbison with his impassioned singing style and dark sunglasses. Apparently at one performance he had forgotten his glasses so donned a pair of prescription sunglasses and so established his distinctive look with dark clothes and dark dominant sunglasses thereafter.

During the session we heard the music of the greats of the day, Carole King, Helen Shapiro, Mick Jagger, Acker Bilk, the Tornadoes, the Ronettes, Gerry and the Pacemakers, Cilla Black, The Supremes and of course the Beatles. For our members we were definitely taken down memory lane by Steve, evoking so many happy memories. "These Beatles songs take me back to my student days – dancing all night in a freezing squash court to the Beatles songs. Thanks so much for the trip down memory lane."
