**A Maths Teaser** 

Did you manage to solve the Maths teaser in the June Newsletter? Don't worry if you were

not able to as the question plus solution now follows:

Question

Steven flew to Hong Kong to start a new job. The flight included a stop in Doha. He flew from

Edinburgh to Doha then from Doha to Hong Kong.

• The flight from Edinburgh to Doha took 6 hours 35 minutes.

• The flight from Doha to Hong Kong took 7 hours 20 minutes.

• Hong Kong is 8 hours ahead of Edinburgh.

Steven's plane took off from Edinburgh at 9:15 am local time. It landed in Hong Kong at 8:50

am local time. How long was the stop in Doha?

Solution

One of the secrets of solving this type of problem is to always work in the same time zone. I am going to work in Hong Kong time so the time in Edinburgh, Hong Kong time, is 9.15 + 8.00

= 17.15.

The total time for the journey between Edinburgh and Hong Kong is 8.50 - 17.15. A tricky

calculation which I tend to do as follows:

17.15 to 0.00 midnight = 6 hours and 45 minutes.

0.00 to 8.50 is 8 hours and 50 minutes.

Total time = 6 hours and 45 minutes + 8 hours and 50 minutes = 14 hours + 45 minutes + 50

minutes = 15 hours and 35 minutes

The total time of the two flights = 6 hours and 35 minutes + 7 hours and 20 minutes = 13

hours and 55 minutes

The time of the stop-over in Doha = 15 hours and 35 minutes - 13 and 55 minutes = 1 hour

and 40 minutes.

Feedback from a few of you suggest that the Maths teasers are too simple (let me know if

you agree), so this year I am going to throw in some slightly more challenging problems. In
