June In the Garden

As I write this, the soil is very dry due to lack of rain. It is good idea to have a water butt in the garden to collect any rain water which can be used for watering your plants . You might also consider using any tea left in the pot for hanging baskets and tubs. Gardens are now very colourful with rhododendrons. The colours are vibrant from pale pink to deep red. After flowering it is a good idea to remove the old heads and give the plants a feed. Hydrangeas will be coming into bloom soon too. Feed them now to ensure larger blooms. Don't plant a row of lettuce all at the same time. Just sow a few seeds each week to give a succession of lettuces ready for salads over the summer months.

A Maths Teaser

Did you manage to solve the Maths teaser in the May newsletter? Don't worry if you did not as the question plus solution now follows:

Question

Write the following values in order from greatest to least.

$$0.388, \frac{3}{8}, 38.38\%, 0.39$$

Justify your answer

Solution

The simplest way to solve this problem is to convert the fraction and percent into decimal form. To convert the percentage just divide 38.38 by 100 which gives you 0.3838 (remember when dividing by 100 you move the decimal point two places to the left).

To convert the fraction you can use long division as shown below

8)3 does not go so put a.

8)30 goes 3 carry 6

8)60 goes 7 carry 4

8)40 goes 5 with no remainder

Final answer = 0.375

Apologies if this is not clear but I have not fully mastered the skills of doing long division using computer software.

Now we have all four numbers in decimal form we can arrange them in order from greatest to least as follows:

$$0.39, \ 0.388, \ 38.38\%, \frac{3}{8}$$

Here is this month's maths teaser for you try. It's particularly suitable for anyone going on a long-haul flight in the near future. The question comes from the 2018 National 5 Applications of Mathematics Paper 1.

Problem

Steven flew to Hong Kong to start a new job. The flight included a stop in Doha. He flew from Edinburgh to Doha then from Doha to Hong Kong.

- The flight from Edinburgh to Doha took 6 hours 35 minutes.
- The flight from Doha to Hong Kong took 7 hours 20 minutes.
- Hong Kong is 8 hours ahead of Edinburgh.

Steven's plane took off from Edinburgh at 9:15 am local time. It landed in Hong Kong at 8:50 am local time. How long was the stop in Doha?
