Maths Teaser

How did you get on with last month's mathematics travel problem? Did you remember the distance/speed/time equation? Don't worry if you did not as the problem plus solution is presented below.

Problem

Janet travelled by car from her home to a meeting. She arrived at the meeting at 10:15 am. She travelled 136 miles at an average speed of 40 mph. During the journey she stopped for 50 minutes for breakfast. Determine the time Janet left home.

The first step is to work out how long Janet's journey took. For this we will use the equation

time =
$$\frac{\text{distance}}{\text{speed}} = \frac{136}{40} = 3.4 \text{ hours}$$

Now we have to convert 0.4 of an hour into minutes. This can be done as follows:

 $0.4 \times 60 = 24 \text{ minutes}$

Thus, the total journey took 3 hours and 24 minutes plus the 50 minutes for breakfast which = 4 hours and 14 minutes

Thus, the time Janet left home = 10:15 - 4:14 = 6:01 am

This month's problems are two percentage questions taken from the 2023 National Mathematics calculator paper.

Question 1

A caravan was bought for £20,000. It depreciated by 11% in the first year. It then depreciated by a further 6% each year over the next two years. Calculate the value of the caravan three years after it was bought.

Question 2

Nadim bought a flat last year. The value of the flat has increased by 8% and it is now worth £94,500. Calculate how much Nadim paid for the flat.
