LOOKING BACK TO SEPTEMBER

The talk by our September Speaker, 'Lesley Taylor Talks Rubbish', about recycling, isn't a topic to instantly set the heart racing, however within a few minutes she had us all engaged. She told us she was a Forest Town lass born and bred and then gave us a brief overview about Veolia, the company she works for.

Did you know the main recycling plant for the whole of Nottinghamshire is based in Forest Town? On Crown Farm Way to be precise, it was built in 2008, opened in 2009 and is the stepping stone between us and the recyclers.

The waste is separated out into four main components, paper, card, metal and plastic, recycling saves using fresh natural resources, recycling a can takes 95% less energy than to make one from new.

Lesley showed us a short video on the various stages of recycling and then distributed a quiz on 'Which bin do you put it in?' This was just for fun but generated a lot of discussion among members at the time.

The results created more discussion and a lot of questions for Lesley, all of which she was happy to answer. There was a forest of hands going up, with one lady to the side of the main aisle looking fit to

burst as she was overlooked several times, but finally she had her question answered.

The following article is in response to a request from members of the group.

Transferring photos from tablet or phone to computer/laptop or memory stick.

"How do I transfer the photos on my phone or tablet to a computer/laptop/USB memory stick* or USB flash drive*" I was asked. *memory stick and flash drive are names for the same device.

ANSWER - This can be done by plugging your phone or tablet into a computer/laptop USB port in the same way as connecting a camera, by using the charger cable, the computer should recognise your phone or tablet as a new drive.

Think first about creating a folder or folders on your computer to transfer your photos into, you can then sort your photos as you go.

Your device may open in a new window or you may get a request box asking 'what do you want to do with this device', choose, 'open to explore files' this will open your device in a new window and allow you to transfer photos to the computer/laptop, photos are usually stored in the DCIM folder on the phone or tablet, (you may need to right click on the device icon to see the files), now open the folder you want to put the photos in on the computer, you may have to resize the windows to see both folders.

There are two ways to transfer the photos, one is to click on the photo with the left mouse button and while holding the button down 'drag' the photo with the cursor across to the new folder.

The other way is to click on the photo with the right mouse button and in the menu that appears select either cut or copy, 'cut' will hold the photo temporarily in memory and remove the photo from the original folder, 'copy' will copy it and leave the photo in the original folder, if you chose either of these methods move your cursor to the new folder, right click in the folder and select 'paste' from the menu.

With your photos stored safely on the computer/laptop they can then be deleted from your phone or tablet and release memory space.

To transfer your photos from the computer to a USB memory stick you plug your memory stick into a USB port and transfer photos from folder to folder using

one of the methods above.

"I don't have access to a computer or laptop", was a point raised, the procedure is a bit more complicated but can be done and needs an OTG (on the go) cable with a micro USB plug that fits your phone or tablet on one end and a female USB plug on the other end, the USB memory stick then plugs into the female USB socket, also needed is a file transfer app, the procedure is a bit too long to explain here, if you are interested contact me through the computer group page on the website.

On the 31st August, six of us visited St Anns Allotments in Nottingham, where we had an enjoyable and informative guided tour. These heritage allotments boast a rich history and have been Grade 2* listed by English Heritage, covering 75 acres of hilly terrain in the northern part of the city. They have been used by residents of Nottingham for over 600 years and comprise the largest area of detached town gardens in the world.

During the 1990s a local campaign strove to preserve the gardens when they were due to be sold off for building development. Funding from The Lottery has provided finances for much improvement, eg, building the Visitor Centre, erecting security fencing, cutting the 35 miles of hedges, and sinking boreholes for water; also planting different varieties of apple trees, pear trees and roses. A number of plots are rented to tenants, others to community projects (eg, Ecoworks) and wildlife organisations (eg, Urban Nature).

Our tour began at the oldest part, Hungerhills, in the centre of the huge site. We walked in sunshine along narrow paths bounded by tall hedgerows, noticing every so often a wooden gate nestling amongst the foliage and leading to one of the plots (we tried to peep through!). Our first stop was the double plot owned by Angela and Mark, where we admired the range of vegetables and fruit, the wonderful "homestead" (complete with home-on-the-range porch) with walls made from used 'For Sale' boards, solar panels connected to a battery and bottled gas for tea-making, etc. Recycling and resourcefulness par excellence! We were intrigued by a deep well that had been found during work on the plot - the water has to be tested before it can be used.

Our next stop was at the Heritage Gardens ("Oliver's Plot"), a beautiful area laid out a few years ago (following long-term ownership by a Mr Oliver) and encompassing different styles and eras (eg, Victorian formal). The small summerhouse contained a room complete with Victorian stove, fittings and furniture. Lottery funding has provided for repairs to the mechanism of the splendid Victorian greenhouse.

The nineteenth century ethos for the allotments was: Peace, Privacy, and Pleasure - and long may these ideas reign! We had a wonderful afternoon exploring part of this amazing site.

In the past weeks the group have also had a visits to peoples homes. At Linda and Keith's we had a tour round the garden, with its thriving plants and picturesque layout, and were then seated indoors to enjoy a cream tea, and music by Keith. Thanks and appreciation from all of us to Linda and Keith (contributions were accepted for the Bluebell Wood Children's Hospice - £50 in all!).

At Andrew and Helen's we found the garden to be beautiful, both front and back, thoughtfully laid out and with plenty of colour and a great variety of interesting plants (names were asked for and duly noted). We enjoyed tea, cake and biscuits in the sunshine. Many thanks to Andrew and Helen for their warm welcome and generosity. I think we all went away with ideas for the future

The Mansfield Area & Clipstone Camp in WW1

Horses, Belgian refugees and the impact one of the largest training camps in the country had on the Mansfield area are features of this talk. While local men enlisted and moved away, an even greater number of soldiers moved into the area to live and train at Clipstone Camp

The camp and the integration of thousands of soldiers into the area brought additional spending power into the locality and quick thinking entrepreneurs took advantage of this. The social implications of the camp were many. Local people and organisations became involved in the moral welfare of the soldiers. Alternatively the moral welfare of young girls were a concern and some 'ladies' were banned from the vicinity of the camp.

Beds in the hospital were needed for war wounded. Schools and local women became involved in events to raise funds and equipment for those participating in the war. However for communities of Mansfield, the camp played a significant part in the people's war.
