#### Membership

Twenty one people joined at the August meeting that takes our membership to 229 which is fantastic having grown from about 123 when we started less than two years ago.

However as indicated in my last report we now have a challenge that some other local U3A's have in that we are reaching the point where we must consider whether we can accept more members. We are restricted at our monthly meetings by the number we are allowed in St Albans to comply with Fire Regulations.

We have monitored attendance since we started and calculated the number of members attending as a percentage of our overall membership, as we are aware that for whatever reason everyone does not attend all the monthly meetings.

Though we were advised when establishing our U3A that waiting lists were not to be encouraged we believe that it makes sense to keep a record of people who might want to join us when vacancies arise and we will do that in the future when the maximum number is reached. We will monitor numbers and keep you advised of the situation in what is a continuing changing picture.

#### Fund Raising

As you are aware we are trying to raise funds to purchase our own projector and screen which we hope will improve the images when we have visiting speakers. We have had donations from local councillors and the promise of £500 from Mansfield Building Society and continue to look for other opportunities for grants. We are also raising money from raffles on some of the coach trips and will be doing so at the Xmas lunch. In addition, our first

specific fund-raising event will be a **coffee morning** which will be held on **Monday 9<sup>th</sup> October 10:00am** at the Sherwood Room at the Forest Town Arena. Tickets are £1 for coffee, biscuits, quiz and a chat, and will be on sale at the September and October monthly meetings.

## LOOKING BACK TO OUR AUGUST MEETING



Malcolm Wells MBE

I think Malcolm Wells was one of the fastest talking speakers we have had and he certainly had plenty to tell us about Canine Partners. He told us how young puppy dogs are trained to become assistant dogs to people with varying disabilities, and as such can change peoples lives.

The dogs adapt to the needs of the individual person, and help them to become independent. To quote from an article in 'Lets Go' the Canine Partners newsletter :-

*Before having Faye [the dog] I was very shy and self-conscious. I would worry what other people thought of me, but now Faye has completely changed that. People actually talk to me now, rather than talking about me or just ignoring me...*

*She gets washing out of the machine, she gets the post for me and she picks things up from the floor. She also helps take my shoes and socks off, flushes the toilet, puts things in the bin and gets money out of the cash machine after I have entered my pin number.*

This is just an example of what Malcolm told us and it was evident that he aroused the interest of our members because of the number of questions that were put to him at the end.

### **OUR VISIT TO THE NATIONAL ARBORETUM - JULY**

Thirty members, no stragglers, were greeted by our Joint Social Secretary Denise Whitsed at the Arena for our trip to the National Arboretum. The journey was only about one hour and when we arrived we had some free time for a coffee or visit to the shop. I took the opportunity to visit one or two of the memorials that were close by the Visitor Centre.

Most of us then congregated in the chapel for a short introductory talk by one of the many volunteers and a recording giving further details. This was followed by the playing of the Last Post, two minutes silence and the playing of the reveille. This was all made

more poignant as there was a family there who had come to remember their 28-year-old son who was killed in Afghanistan.

We then had time to visit some of the memorials. There are over 100 throughout the 150-acre site, mostly of a military nature but others for organisation such as the scout movement and Toc H. We then all came together for a very good three course lunch that was served to us in a private part of the restaurant area.

After lunch, we joined the Land Train for 45 minutes which gave us an over view of part of the arboretum. We then had further time to explore on our own and I took the opportunity to visit, amongst many others, the main cenotaph [The Wall] that lists all the names of all those who lost their lives in overseas conflicts.

The site is so large that there isn't the opportunity on one visit to see all the memorials and many of those who went on our visit said they would want to go again. The entire day was very interesting and thought provoking and had been excellently organised by Denise.

After training Bill went to serve in Burma and Tommy went to Normandy shortly after D Day and was part of the push through France.

They never met again but kept in touch over the years by letter and phone and so it was an emotional meeting at the Arboretum. One of Tommy's medals is the Legion d'Honneur and one of Bill's is the Burma Star.

Tommy's friend and his wife were waiting for us on our arrival. Denise had already taken photos of Tommy with his medals before we left and asked him to leave the bus first to greet his friend. They spent the day together and also had lunch with us, I think it made Tommy's year, let alone his day!

Our route gave magnificent views of the long ridge comprising the peaks of Mam Tor, Back Tor and Lose Hill, the highest tops being moodily shrouded in cloud.

It was a beautiful day for our South Yorkshire walk on 16<sup>th</sup> August. Setting off from the picturesque village of High Hoyland, we enjoyed clear views most of the morning for miles across the Pennine landscape. The 330 metre Emley Moor TV tower dominated the skyline. It replaced a tubular steel mast which collapsed spectacularly in March 1969 blacking out reception for millions of viewers.

On reaching the Yorkshire Sculpture Park, we admired, puzzled over and debated the merits of artforms set in the beautiful grounds of Bretton Hall. After lunch in the sunshine by the lake, we encountered some thought provoking woodland artwork on our shaded uphill return to High Hoyland.

## FROM COMPUTER BOB

### Google Search Tips

#### Turn your iPhone or iPad into a magnifying glass

All iOS devices have a great Magnifier tool that lets you use the camera on your device to zoom in on hard-to-read print in newspapers, magazines or books.

You first need to enable the feature. Open Settings, tap General, Accessibility, Magnifier, then switch on Magnifier in this section.

To activate the magnifier press the Home button three times (fairly rapidly), slide the - + zoom slider to zoom in and out of what you are reading.

If you find it difficult to keep your hand steady when reading your magnified text tap the lock icon or the big white button at the bottom of the screen (this depends on which device you are using) this freezes the print you are looking at, tap again to release.

Tap the lightning icon to switch on the torch, the icon with three circles at the bottom right lets you adjust the brightness and contrast, the tabs above the sliders (White/Blue, Yellow/ Blue and so on) let you add different filters which may help you view some items better.
