Our route circuited Staunton Harold reservoir, taking in the stately homes of Calke Abbey and Staunton Harold Hall. Georganne brought them to life for us with potted histories.

A long lunch break was taken at the side of the lake at Staunton Harold Hall admiring the view in warm sunshine, but we were still ready for tea and cakes at the Melbourne Hall tea shop at the end of a glorious autumn walk.

We walked along the river Don and part of the Trans Pennine Trail. We continued past Nabbs Wood where there is a memorial to the 26 children who died in the Huskar Pit disaster in 1838.



Huskar Pit was a coal mine on the South Yorkshire Coalfield, sunk to work the Silkstone seam. It was located in Nabs Wood, outside the village of Silkstone Common, in the then West Riding of Yorkshire.

Our next rambles: 3rd October: Woodhouse Eaves, Swithland Wood, and Bradgate Country Park, Leicester (8.5 miles). 17th October: Eddlestow Lot, Lumsdale and Cuckoostone (7.5 miles). Meet at the Arena car park to arrange lift sharing, departing at 08:40 am prompt. New members always welcome.

It is as safe as current security methods can make it. All website addresses start with **HTTP://** or **HTTPS://** when using your bank account or shopping online, make sure that the website address starts with **HTTPS://** - (**Hyper Text Transfer Protocol Secure**) this is the secure version of **HTTP** - the protocol used to send data between your computer, ipad or tablet, and the website that you are connected to. The '**S**' at the end of **HTTPS** shows the site is **Secure** and all communications between your device and the website are encrypted.

Make a practice of regularly changing your bank or online shopping account(s) password, and think twice before ticking the box asking if you want 'this site to remember your password'.
