Eleven members met for our January meeting, when we had an illustrated slide show on the history of Forest Town Anglican churches, starting with St Davids Mission Church built in 1905 and then St

Alban's Church 1911. As usual there was plenty of discussion on the photographs leaving us with some questions unanswered.



We take so much for granted these days that it is hard to imagine that for many years the church or the parsonage did not have an electricity supply. A photograph of a memorial service at the cenotaph showed a Scottish Piper and rows of men lined up in the road; this was in stark contrast to the armistice services today when traffic is not even stopped for the two minutes silence.

One notable thing was that at all ceremonial events the ladies and young girls all wore hats, and that the styles in 1929 differed very much from those in 1911 & 18. As the light faded and Pauline could not read her notes it was time to put the lights on and stop for refreshments and a good chat.

With only 20 minutes to go to the end of the meeting we decided to continue the slide show next month, and spent the rest of the time discussing the A - Z Book project and what we could learn from the 1939 Register to help with this. Pauline
