This month started off with the usual question, 'Have you found out anything new about your family in the past month?' Boy did we have some input! Mick had been busy in the Parish records and also the local newspaper archives and had come up with a couple of obituary reports about his mother's first husband, who died over Poland during a bombing raid on Berlin. Even luckier was that there was a photo attached to the articles. He'd also sent for his father's full birth certificate and we discovered his grandmother had been working in a munitions factory at the time; some time was then spent speculating as to where this was likely to be as she lived in Kirkby....?

After Mick had finished, David produced a tattered old leather bag which he slapped on the table. It had belonged to his mother and was stuffed with papers and a photo album recording his father's time in the Army during World War 2. There were his service papers, some early tourist guides for visitors to Delhi and Bombay and the photo album recorded all the places in and around the Indian sub-continent his

father had either been stationed at or had visited, and best of all, there were captions under the photos giving location and date! Where had these treasures been found? In the loft during a clear out and the bag was destined for the tip before a timely rescue by David.

I had planned to do an exercise with the group to get them thinking about where else we can look for Family History sources other than the Internet, which is valuable but not the be all and end all. We did the thinking in the time left before tea break and then looked at the results after suitable refreshment; apart from the usual sources, all the couples had come up with something different that the others hadn't thought of, Ann had a cookery book in which were recorded family details and occasions, a variation on the family bible but no less valuable. As I'd intended to do this I'd made notes beforehand and one of my sources said 'Anything from the past stored in the loft, don't allow anyone to throw anything out before you've checked it'. How lucky that David had done this before our session as all the history in his mum's bag would otherwise have been lost to him forever! Jenny

Local History

We started the session this month with a DVD, called Past Mansfield in Pictures; it was based on postcards and photographs, made possible with the invention of the Box Brownie camera and it really took off around the late 1800s and early 1900s as a means of recording events and communicating with family and friends. There were many buildings featured in and around Mansfield, and although a lot of them are long gone they were remembered by quite a few of us. Also covered was, the coming of public transport, starting with the trams and moving through to the omnibus. There was one accident recorded where a tram was overloaded, they were officially allowed to carry a maximum of 60 but often had over a 100 passengers, especially at the end of a shift at the local pits. The tram ran away down Skerry Hill and eventually came to rest in a shoe shop window. The DVD also covered occasions that happened in Mansfield, the official event marking the coming of the gasometer, how many of you can remember that on Church Lane? Also the First World War tank that stood in Titchfield Park and was gifted to the town as a thank you for the amount of money donated to the war effort by local people?

After tea break we had a general discussion, about the film and other topics, including what was happening in the Forest Town area. What had

happened to the vicarage wall? Would we get the railings around the War Memorial in time for the Remembrance Service next month? Apparently not maybe next year. What was happening with the boundary stone? No railings around that please...., and also what was going to happen to the land at the top of New Mill Lane? Watch this space, Local History isn't always about the past, it's being made every day. Jenny

On Saturday 12th October the National Trust Group visited Calke Abbey. There was plenty to see and do on this beautiful autumn day. A guided walk around some of the 600 acres of parkland, drink coffee, eat scones, see the fantastic flower gardens with a

seasonal display of pumpkins and gourds in the auricula theatre and the early eighteenth century house.

The house itself is unique in that it is preserved in a state of deterioration. A bed piled high with taxidermy, rusting metal objects, cracks in the ceiling, peeling wallpaper and cases upon cases of stuffed animals and birds. The latter a pastime and preoccupation of several generations of the Harpur Crewe family and was their way of recording natural history. The family rarely threw anything away so consequently there are over 30,000 items stored in the house, ranging from fine art to broken chairs and tools.

We had a fun day out, with mixture of being outside in the fresh air surrounded by trees and plants, glimpsing into a family's past life and most of all the companionship of our U3A members. Ann

On our first Ramble in October we explored the beautiful Churnet Valley in Staffordshire on a perfect autumn day. Setting off from Froghall Wharf, we walked the towpath of the Caldon Canal for a couple of miles as far as Consall Station, glimpsing steam trains running along the nearby heritage line. Climbing steeply through woods up the Devil's Staircase, we passed Belmont Hall to reach the heights of Noonsum Common with panoramic views. Lunch taken in a field attracted the attention of 3 curious horses which nuzzled and nibbled us throughout. Heading back through the delightful villages of Ipstones and Foxt, we ended our walk in Hetty's café at Froghall Wharf where the raspberry and banana scones went down a treat



For our second Ramble we started from Osmaston Village, it was a mild day however due to the amount of rain we had the previous days the ground was very muddy in places.

We walked to Shirley we had our lunch in the church yard. We then walked towards Osmaston Saw Mill in the valley of Shirley Brook, this was dammed to power mills, of which the most spectacular is this saw mill. The mill is a rather eccentric alpine style building constructed in 1845 for the owners of Osmaston Hall in whose grounds the mill lies.



The Mill was restored in 2009 and is only open to visitors in February for one week. **Our next rambles:** 6th November: Rowsley, Stanton Moor, Winster & Birchover (8.7 miles) 20th November: Duke's Wood, Eakring (8 miles).
