Strollers hunt the Gruffalo





Learning to use the Family Search website

We were a smaller group than usual this month, with four of our members unable to join us for various reasons. However the rest of us were soon involved in looking at how to use the free website *Family Search*, which is the Mormon site.

Julie and Andy had used this in the past but hadn't been on it for some time and had needed a refresher in navigating it, which they thought the rest of us might find useful.

Neither Pauline, Malcolm or myself had ever used this site, therefore we were interested in what it had to offer.

Julie started off by explaining that although she used *Ancestry* to build her trees, *Family Search* was useful as a research tool to check that the information she had found was correct.

It also has the added benefit that you can look at records from America and other places, enabling you to find out more about ancestors who had emigrated.

Although you can do this on both Ancestry and Find my Past it costs more for a worldwide membership, so unless you're prepared to cough up, your only other option is to visit the library as they do have worldwide



coverage of Ancestry.

Pauline asked if she would be able to find any information on one of her ancestors, Edward Rice, who she knew had emigrated to America with his family.

She had some basic details about him with her so Andy entered them on the site and we were soon looking at records about Edward. Pauline was able to add quite a lot of extra information about him and his family as well as confirming what she already knew.

We came away impressed with what Family Search has to offer as a research tool and are all intending to give it a go. Oh, one other thing we learnt during the afternoon, don't drop the crockery at Flint Avenue, it explodes. But, if you do have an accident, the dustpan

and brush is in the cupboard under the sink.

An excellent tour round Kent

Around Rochester in Kent, is a landscape of rolling hills, woodlands, interesting properties and bespoke gardens. Therefore, as summer approached and the diary began to fill up, it was great to join the u3a holiday to the aptly named 'Garden of England'. Yet this holiday proved to offer so much more.

One particularly interesting visit was to Hever Castle, once the childhood home of Anne Boleyn, second wife of Henry VIII and mother of Elizabeth I. Panelled rooms, fine

furniture and a collection of Tudor portraits resonated with history. All could have been lost to the nation had not William Waldorf Astor used his fortune to restore and extend the castle and enhance its delightful gardens.

A later visit to Knole, originally an archbishop's palace, impressed everyone with its treasures such as the 3 magnificently ornate state beds, showrooms, elegant ballroom and long galleries which were in such a contrast to the more intimate Gatehouse Tower in one corner of the building. Here we learnt about the life and lovers of former resident Eddy Sackville-West, a well-known cultural figure in the 1930s and 40s, as we climbed the spiral staircase to enjoy the panoramic views of the countryside.

The lovely gardens and grounds of Chartwell House reinforced the beauty of Kent. Chartwell acted as a soothing family home for Winston Churchill. Atmospheric and redolent of Churchill's presence, it reflected his love of landscape and nature, much of which was shown in the largest collection of Churchill's paintings.

Good weather ensured that Emmett's Gardens and Pashley Manor Gardens were full of spring colour bluebell drifts, cascading wisteria along with vibrant azaleas and rhododendrons. Yet it was the medieval moated Scotney Castle, that revealed the green-winged orchid within a most picturesque setting.

Free time in Tunbridge Wells and Broadstairs meant everyone could 'do their own thing', whether it was walking along the sands or visiting the shops or the towns'

Kent provided a u3a holiday filled with great memories, interest and stimulation; our courteous, expert driver Winston ensured safe, relaxing travel. Yet special thanks must go to Liz Wilson and Denise Whitsed for their careful organisation, thoughtful planning, attention to detail and for leading such an excellent tour.

- 15th October- Kedlestone Hall. £8


That will conclude the 2022 National Trust visits. Hopefully we will be visiting more places next year!

Ramblers get Giddy!

May is the month the rambling group looks for walks with bluebells, and our first walk from Cromford to Matlock didn't disappoint.

The steep climb from Cromford Meadows was through the woods to Hearthstone Lane had them in abundance along with red campion, stitchwort, celandine and wild garlic. A ridge walk provided spectacular views as we headed to Riber Castle, a dark semi–Gothic Victorian folly that dominates the skyline above Matlock. After a slippery steep descent with views over Matlock, we faced another stiff ascent up High Tor where we contemplated the sheer drop from Giddy Edge, one of the highest inland cliffs in England, with Matlock Bath in miniature 300 feet below.

A riverside walk to Hall Leys Park and Matlock town centre provided a huge contrast before yet another steep ascent to Shining Cliff woods which we wandered through back to Cromford passing underneath the Heights of Abraham cable car.

Setting out on our next walk in glorious sunshine from near the South Yorkshire village of Wortley, birthplace of the notorious highwayman Swift Nick, the Trans Pennine Trail soon gave us long views over rolling countryside and
