

Our first walk in March was led by Carol from Ashfield u3a. A steep ascent out of Matlock Bath took us to the war memorial high above Matlock with commanding views over the town.

Then it was up thorough Lumsdale, a steep sided wooded gorge, with the ruins of historic watermills and spectacular waterfalls. Continuing on uphill, we eventually arrived at our lunch spot, Cocking Tor, with extensive views from Ashover across to Ogsten reservoir, with Hardwick Hall and Bolsover Castle in the far distance. Our return route was largely downhill thankfully, through pleasant countryside with Riber Castle marking our direction of travel. A visit to the

café in Matlock's lovely Hall Leys park rounded off a fine walk.

Snowmelt made our second walk in March from Linacre Reservoirs near Cutthorpe in Derbyshire quite challenging. A ford across an insignificant stream on the recce was now a torrent which we did well to cross without getting wet feet. Mud, deep in places, provided a significant slip risk, but we had only one faller, thankfully without injury.

On the plus side, this was an interesting and varied walk with some fine country houses to admire, lovely views to take in, fields of alpacas to watch and a very strange horse jump in the shape of a giant swan to climb on.

Our next rambles: 5 April: Nether Broughton, Queensway Old Dalby, Old Dalby and Upper Broughton (7.8 miles). 19 April: Combs reservoir and the White Hall Centre (8.3 miles). New members welcome.
