His graphic accounts of road traffic collisions and other medical emergencies where EMICS – a team of volunteer doctors who assist the East Midlands Ambulance Service – attend, wasn't exactly entertainment but it was instructive. ### Fun finding the route with fish & chips to boot

With our illustrious leader, Andy, incapacitated, it fell to Helen to lead the first walk in July, Cowers Lane & Turnditch. As Helen explained to the eight members starting the walk, it came with a health warning. Whilst she had accompanied Andy on the recce, that was five weeks earlier and, had she known she would be leading, she'd have paid more attention to the route!!

Armed, after a crash course the night before, with Andy's GPS and map, the group set off on the road to cross the railway bridge.

As a back-up, Andy has sent Carol an electronic copy of the route. At the point where we were to leave the road Carol confidently shouted right turn. Striding out on a level path Helen was still grappling with the GPS. After 15 minutes or so it became apparent that the group was doing the circular route backwards. No wonder the GPS didn't like it. To be fair, Carol had not been told which way round we were doing it. The leader should have known that – oops! But, we were, where we were, and everyone agreed there was no point in turning back. Georganne, Mary and Carol all mucked in with route finding and it became a collaborative adventure.

To add to the navigational challenge, the paths in this part of the Peak District are very little walked so there were many sections with no visible path. Stiles were overgrown with 6ft high nettles and brambles blocking the way. The secateurs that Andy had suggested Helen bring, were put to good use.

Having a drink in the pub at the end of the walk everyone agreed they'd had a lovely, if more chaotic than usual, day's walk.

Overgrown paths were an extra challenge!

The second walk in July was

the group's annual mini-bus trip. For 2023 we chose a walk from Grosmont down the Esk valley to Whitby where a fish and chip tea awaited before the bus ride home. Following the river wasn't as easy as it sounds - there were plenty of ups and downs to challenge the group. The weather was lovely although it did cloud over as we arrived into Whitby - making the choice between a paddle and a pint that much easier!!

The group had only one walk in August due to a lastminute medical scare and a poor weather forecast resulting in the abandonment of our first.

However, our sole August walk was a classic, high up in the moors west of Sheffield. We enjoyed an easy start, heading downhill with views over Strines reservoir and past Boot's Folly, a 45 foot high tower. The tower is no longer accessible as the spiral staircase has been

removed, allegedly after a cow ascended the stairs and became stuck. Passing below the reservoir dam, we began a long and, at times, steep climb to the highest point of Derwent Edge, Back Tor at 1,765 feet. Having just nicely settled down to eat our lunch and admire the view, we were attacked by clouds of thunder flies, forcing us to quickly pack up and move on.

Views from the edge were magnificent, with Emley Moor TV mast to the distant north, Kinder Scout and the Great Ridge to the west and Stanage Edge to the south, Ladybower reservoir below us and Cottam power station far to the east. Those pesky flies though showed no mercy, giving up pursuit only after we left the edge.
