At the September Trace Your Family Tree meeting, Andy and Julie spoke of attending a recent family funeral where they met many family members they had not seen for years. This had led to them making many new family history discoveries including spending two days with Andy's older brother looking at many photos and other family memorabilia. Funerals may be sad but they are a good way of gaining new family history information.

They also gave us an update on a the free BMD website and told us of another website for free parish registers.

Pauline and Jenny have been delving further into the

history of Ada Elizabeth Young, the VAD nurse buried in St Alban's Churchyard, who died at Clipstone Camp Military Hospital and have made some interesting discoveries about her family in both England and Ireland.

At the October meeting we spent the first half of the session chatting about some of the extra features that can be found on the various internet genealogy sites. It just shows how much more

information these sites hold. We all decided that we needed to make more use of them to help our research. We just need more time!

The discussion also looked at some DNA results and how much DNA could help further develop our knowledge and information about ourselves. The television programme DNA Journeys shows how much information our DNA holds and how it can sometimes locate and enhance family information.

The second half of the meeting looked at a selection of Scottish gravestones and some Scottish birth, marriage and death records. It was amazing how much information they put on some of their grave memorials and records about how and where people died and, more importantly, for family tree research the wives also have their maiden names recorded.

Memorable visits

Our last two visits for this year were memorable in many ways. On the first we walked in the footsteps of King Charles II at Mosley Old Hall, seeing the very small priest hole where he hid from Cromwell's soldiers. It was then on to the Victorian Wightwick Manor with its wonderful William Morris and the Arts & Crafts interiors. The many art works are displayed in such a way to ensure that the very essence of a home is conveyed. The gardens were beautiful and perfect for a picnic in the gorgeous September sunshine.

In October we visited Stoneywell and Calke Abbey. Two very contrasting properties. We had a guided tour of Stoneywell, the home of the Gimson family, whose love of the Arts & Craft movement pervades every nook and cranny. The cottage was built into a rocky outcrop in





Charnwood Forest and the 11 rooms sit on seven different levels. A challenging build! Stoneywell reflects perfectly William Morris's golden rule: 'Have nothing in your house that you do not know to be useful or believe to be beautiful.'

Calke Abbey in its preserved fragile state is crammed full of natural history collections and probably a bit like Mr Straw's house but on a much bigger scale. There were lots of guides in the house to give nuggets of information on the numerous collections. The grounds are a magnificent expanse.

Three counties explored

For our first walk in September it was an elite 'famous five' setting out. After a 'gentle' climb from the old station car park on the Monsal Trail of 450ft in half a mile we were rewarded with some great views of the Derbyshire countryside even though it was a little misty to begin with. The weather wasn't as hot as forecast and proved not too overbearing. We found a lovely spot in Hassop for our lunch break where three of us bought fresh organic milk directly from the farm and it was delicious. As we passed Holme Bank Chert Mine we were taken aback by the cold coming out of the mine. We concluded the walk with a visit to the Lime Tree Cafe in Bakewell for a little light refreshment.

The second walk in September was billed as a very pleasant 7.2 miles walk through undulating countryside with good views and some local history in the South Wingfield and Pentrich area. In the event, heavy rain limited the views and full waterproofs were definitely the order of the day.

The affluent South Derbyshire village of Repton was the starting point of our first walk in October. Repton is dominated by its independent boarding school, which Jeremy Clarkson and Graeme Gardner of



The Goodies attended.

A particularly wet and muddy track led us to the banks of the River Trent, then across the flood plain to the Anchor Church near Ingleby. This is a series of caves carved into the sandstone by the river, which have been extended to form a crude dwelling place, complete with door and window holes. Flooding of our riverside path forced us to take a higher route through rolling countryside.

We eventually came to Foremark Hall, a grand Grade 1 listed Palladian manor house, now the home of Repton Preparatory School. Tea and cakes in the Repton community café rounded off a lovely warm and sunny walk.

We had a rare foray into
Leicestershire for our second walk,
setting out from the village of Nether
Broughton. Little did we know we had
embarked on an assault course,
having to battle our way over 35
stiles, along paths overgrown with
brambles, through deep mud while
trying to avoid touching electrified
fences. Skirting a deep muddy puddle
using a wire fence for support, poor
Rita touched an electrified wire, let
out a shriek and ended up with her
bottom in the mire.


On the plus side, the hills above Old Dalby afforded magnificent views over the Vale of Belvoir, the villages we passed through were lovely, we
