LOOKING BACK TO OUR MAY MEETING



Forest Town, the Village that Grew out of Coal

Our Speaker for May was our very own Pauline Marples, ably assisted by husband, Malcolm. The talk was on the development of Forest Town from a small, mainly farming community through to the village we know today.

Pauline told us about the early days when the Bolsover Colliery Company realised there was money to be made from the area and moved in to sink and develop the Mansfield (Crown Farm) Colliery. In the process they built the Avenues to house the workers and other amenities to provide for their needs.

The talk took us through not just the industrial history but also the growth of a community, and people came to life, with a look at the shops, school, the building of St. Alban's Church, Miners' Institute and the Drill Hall, plus local celebrities of whom Morgan Kingston, the 'Singing Miner' was one. Even the sanitary arrangements which held more than one surprise for the unsuspecting occupant of the pan closets came under scrutiny!

Many thanks to Pauline and Malcolm for this entertaining and fascinating look at our local area, even if you're a lifelong resident I'm sure you found out something about Forest Town that you didn't know or simply enjoyed a trip down Memory Lane.

OLD and CURIOUS OCCUPATIONS With Dennis Hill at our July meeting

Over the centuries we have seen many old and curious occupations disappear; some have been soaked up by our factories, while others have either gone abroad or been reduced to curious crafts only to be seen at country fairs or special events.

This illustrated talk takes a look at 60 old occupations in 60 minutes, some of which you will be familiar with, while others you may never have heard of. We take a look at occupations from a wide period of time, from the mediaeval period right up to living memory. Some of those occupations may have only been part time for a small number of people, while others employed tens of thousands of people. The names of some occupations cause quite a bit of amusement.

In many cases the audience will be given the opportunity to have a guess at what a person did before the answer is revealed, which causes quite a bit of amusement. You will certainly end up the evening with a lot of curious facts that you will be able to tease your family and friends with."

Dennis Hill, is a well known local and family historian he was a founder member of Mansfield Family History Society and a mentor on the Nottinghamshire Living History Archive Millennium Scheme

Among the historical aspects in the churchyard we looked at Nurse Young's memorial stone, a commemorative sundial and later editions to the church. We digress to the cemetery tucked away behind the school, that most people were unaware of, see photo on next page. This gave the opportunity to view the rear of the old school toilets [very historical - Ed].



We were disappointed to see the school guttering had been replaced and the hopper head with 1915 had gone. The plaque over the shops was pointed out which gave the age of the building. There were several opportunities to look behind the shops and see the old stable buildings. An added bonus was to meet the former owner of the Travellers Rest [once a farm] who enlarged on the history of the farm and the farm buildings

It was interesting to see the original brickwork design of the Drill Hall and Bolsover colliery plaques giving the date 1909. We finished the walk in the Arena for coffee and a chat. **Our next meeting will be on 16th June 2.15pm at Flint Avenue Centre**

Rambling

Rambles from 7 miles up to 9 miles on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month.

For the ramble on Wednesday 4th May the group ventured for the first time into South Yorkshire, setting off from Thorpe Salvin (near Worksop) to Netherthorpe airfield where we were able to view the parked light aircraft and the take-offs and landings taking place. We continued on to Turnerwood where we joined the Chesterfield Canal, and fortunately were able to watch a couple of canal narrow boats working their way up through the locks.



We helped an elderly lady with the opening and closing of the lock gates too. (*I had always wanted to see how much effort it would take to open and close lock gates!*). Afterwards we carried on over the Lindrick Golf Course to reach Anston Stones Wood, with unbelievable numbers of wild flowers lining the paths.

After lunch we continued through South Anston to re-join the canal at Thorpe Bridge for a second stretch of this lovely waterway and passed through Old Spring Wood, which was more or less completely carpeted with bluebells and wood anemones. I have

walked through these woods many times before, but the flowers have never been as beautiful as they were on our ramble today. We ended our day with drinks/cuppas at The Parish Oven Inn in Thorpe Salvin.

Our ramble on a rainy 18th May started from Minninglow car park on the High Peak Trail, with immediate interest in a high stone embankment built in the 1820s. A short ascent of Minninglow Hill, a hilltop that can be seen from miles away, then on down to Royston Grange followed by crossing the bridge over the Balidon Quarry link to its modern extensions. This was a noisy interruption to the serenity and quietness of the countryside – and within seconds it was all behind us.

We headed southwest over a series of fields for Parwich towards lunchtime, with big views of rolling countryside. Thankfully the rain showers ended leaving us with a drier afternoon as we descended into the village where we worked our way past the church and on to the distinctive school. After passing Parwich Hall we followed paths out of the village northwards past Upper Moor Farm and on to Gotham to re-join the High Peak Trail for the final 1/3 of a mile back to the car park. We then retired to the Wharf Café in Cromford for well-earned cuppas. Another two really good days out.

Our next rambles will be Manifold Valley and Ecton Hill (Wed. 1st June, 8/9m), followed by Hathersage, Nether Hurst, Bamford and Shatton (Wed. 15th June, 8½ m, led by James Parnham), meeting at Arena car park to organise lift sharing and to depart at 08:40 am. New members welcome.

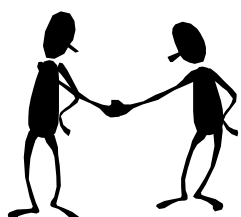
