


Monthly Meeting: Thursday 17 August 2023


Science and Technology

"In Dominion, Holland is hugely ambitious, exploring the history and impact of Christianity. There can be few books that begin in Ancient Persia and conclude with the #MeToo movement. Some of the group found such a wideranging approach made for a hefty, dense read, while others were engaged by Holland's easy, often humorous, writing style. All were fascinated by his underlying argument that, though churches in the Western world are emptying, Christian instincts continue to 'infuse people's morals and

presumptions so utterly' that many 'fail even to detect their presence'. I found it a thought-provoking read that convincingly outlined how evident such instincts remain in science, secularism, gay rights, and even in atheism."

Our August meeting was on 7th when we discussed "Around the World in 80 Trains", by Monisha Rajesh. We'll put our review of it in the next newsletter.

A Day in the Life of a UCI Volunteer

I check my gear – polo shirt, cap, jacket, accreditation, bike padlock and helmet, shades, and set off for my shift. The bus time table westwards is out of kilter, so I travel to shifts by my bike. Heading west on the Canal, it is fun to watch the bird life, dodging

the walkers, prams, children, dogs and suddenly I am turning off the route and heading down to Archerhill Road.

Roads are blocked around the Centre in Knightswood, which makes travel easy. I pass the entrance to the competitors' tented village, pass the work force entrance, the spectator entrance and down to the bike store, returning by the same route. Security checks my accreditation, rucksack and I am inside. Spectator Services Manager, Ruth, welcomes us with a laugh, a smile and divides up the work force. Some will welcome spectators, some with assist wheel chair users and

others with special needs, and a small team will work the Plaza At the Information Desk we answer a myriad of questions, or confer via radio with a manager. Sun screen and hand gel are there for anyone to use, ear fenders both for children and a few adults - the music can be very loud. People come from literally the 4 corners of the globe – USA, Japan, Australia, New Zealand, Canada, Europe, Africa and South America. We can identify the riders by their glorious national tops – after the competitions they swop them with other riders. Netherlands has bright orange, of course; South

Africa is very colourful; Australia has a dark green top with First Nation markings.

The riders are as young as seven or into their sixties. They come with their siblings, families and meet friends they rode against at competitions in other lands. Their commitment to the sport is tremendous; their speed on the track breath-taking; the crashes hard to watch and then the thunderous applause when they pick themselves up and ride on to the end. We are privileged to serve them at this the greatest cycling championship ever to be held in Scotland.

About Our Members – Jean Marshall

Our Chair Gail is a very persuasive person and so I came away from a meditative medieval music concert having promised to write this piece! Ellen was also on hand to encourage so I couldn't really refuse. I say all this because as Scottish women know we are nae meant tae write pieces aboot wirsels. However, the message of this piece is about how having moved from Aberdeen to Glasgow the West End group has been a real social lifesaver. I hope my experience will resonate with many.

Lockdown

My story starts three years ago when I came down to Glasgow for a short stay with my daughter who lives and works here. I drove down on Friday March 20th 2020! I did not drive back till the end of August as Aberdeen was put on additional lockdowns. During this period, we were fortunate to be accepted as volunteers with the Sikh Temple food delivery scheme so we had a round three times a week and I had a pass to show police should we be stopped. I rediscovered Glasgow as I had spent from '79 to '85 here in Giffnock and my girls were born at Rottenrow. My neighbour and good friend of 30 plus years in Aberdeen had also moved to Glasgow pre Covid to be near family and so I was seeing her regularly again. On returning to Aberdeen, it seemed to me time to make a decision as to whether to resume my life pre Covid which meant returning to

Citizens Advice, the Alternative Family Care panel and Advocacy or having been forced to make the break by Covid move to Glasgow and start a new life here. My decision was hastened one rainy September evening when I returned home to find the electricity off and only mine not the street. Going up two flights with a torch and searching skirting boards for plugs etc helped me make my mind up! The actual move came sooner than I had anticipated as my house sold in a week and an exhausting period followed of trying to dismantle a family home of 34 years on my own as lockdowns came back again. I still had some very good friends and months pre lockdown I searched for a Glasgow branch and found the West End. I think I started with coffee at Binghams Pond. I found that space was readily made for me and folk welcoming to a newcomer. A new members meeting was held in the summer in Peter 's garden which was a great idea and I met Gail for the first time. Gail at that meeting talked about the Moto group she had heard about before moving up here and that it might work for the West End. Well, what a success that is proving to be! It is brilliant to feel that you can post about a concert event, walk etc and find companions to go with or see an interest posted that



neighbours without whom I would have sunk under! I moved to Glasgow in February 2021 with Covid restrictions back on. I travelled down in my car stuffed with belongings I hoped would be enough to see me through a rental period until I could move into a permanent place. That period lasted until November 2021 when I got the keys to my new flat and my storage 'stuff' and furnishings could be retrieved.

Joining u3a

Meanwhile having joined U3A Aberdeen for a few

you didn't know about. I have had so many good experiences through U3A since moving. I enjoy my food! I can eat on my own if necessary but for me it is so much better with company. Therefore, the Sunday Lunch and Lunch Bunch groups have been brilliant in enabling me to enjoy a variety of cuisines with interesting folk to talk to. Cinema and Local History are also groups I have joined although I have not been able to attend as frequently as hoped. Two highlight extremes have been the Boozical Calamity Jane Brunch and the

Necropolis visit! I am a member of the walking groups as well although have only managed one of the longer walks. Every second Monday morning is a staple on my calendar for a walk. I have led a couple myself as I want to support the group and feel it is something I can do.

At the Xmas party last year, I was delighted to find mention of a possible writing group starting up. It has now been going some months and is led by Charlie. How grateful am I for this group! Writing is a new interest for me although I have written previously for school shows etc. I now have the time which I never had before to write and although I joined the group thinking of short prose pieces it is poetry I am producing. I would not be doing so without the enormous encouragement of this group.

Positive beginnings

So, to conclude I still do volunteering as advocated by Ellen in her piece last month but I have not gone back to my Aberdeen commitments as they could at times be heavily demanding and took an emotional toll. Moving as many of you have done is a huge emotional drain even when it is for positive new beginnings. I have found U3A Glasgow to be a great source to find folk with mutual interests and for opportunities to engage in activities and new learning. Thank you West End U3A and for any readers who might be considering a move to a new location then find out if there is a branch there and if it's anything like West End then a transition will be so much easier
