
History Book Group

Below is a review by one of our members of our last read, John McKendrick's 'Darien: A Journey in Search of Empire'.

'Most of us knew a little of the story of the 'Company of

Scotland' and its ill-fated attempts to establish a colony in Panama in the late seventeenth century and hoped this book would help us find out more. However, our discussion highlighted that this was very much a Marmite book - some of the group loved it, others vehemently disliked it. The former found it an easy and informative read which clearly explained the complicated relationships



both between the various European powers and between those and the indigenous people. The latter found it a book not only in need of some serious editing but also one which reached simplistic conclusions written in a tone that made some of us deeply uncomfortable.'

Ventures With a Bus Pass

Ventures with a Bus Pass meets monthly on the second Friday of the month and, quite simply ventures forth using our Bus Passes.

It's amazing how many places can be reached (and returned from) in a day from

Glasgow, using the Bus Pass!

Each month, we choose a destination and, after a bit of research, details are sent giving the bus departure time and departure location

(usually Buchanan St. Bus Station). We ask anyone joining us to book their own seat, if applicable, then be at the meeting point 10 - 15 minutes before departure.

We usually give details of

Things To Do, such as Heritage Trails, Parks, Museums, Shops plus any suggestions from group members

who have visited the area previously. A lunch venue will be chosen and booked although adventurers might have their own itinerary to pursue, before being back at the return departure point for the journey home.

We have visited a number of places such as Largs, Perth, Moffat, Strathaven, Inverary and Dundee. The weather has not stopped us, when

is to discuss the cases of individual prisoners of conscience and write letters supporting their release. The volume of letters can sometimes influence regimes who arbitrarily arrest and imprison people for exercising their most basic human rights.
