
# U30 learn, laugh, live

This month's speaker is Allan Mauchline who is a Volunteer Team Leader with Scotservs.
Scotservs is a Volunteer-Led Emergency Medical Transport Charity which has operated since 2011. They deliver

Specialist Medical Logistics Services, door to door, to NHS Scotland around the clock, 365 days a year. Their services support empowers the NHS the means to reinvest funds currently

utilised in urgent transport (otherwise paid to expensive couriers or taxis) back into areas where it is needed most - frontline services and patient care. Scotservs use motorcycles and specialist vehicles to deliver everything other than the patient to where it is needed.

"What do you look for in

an author of general histories? An encyclopaedic knowledge of a broad range of subjects is a given; a sense of humour helps too; the ability to see connections between subjects and present them in a coherent, concise and entertaining manner is a real bonus. Step forward then Bill Bryson who, throughout his writing career, has developed those skills and lays them out at

great length in "At Home".

Most of the history book group liked the book, though some felt that it would have benefitted from an editor taking a blue pencil to some of the many facts within.

Others felt that Bryson skimmed over modern

sensibilities about matters

such as slavery, and that the private lives described were mostly of the wealthy."

#### **About Our Members**

#### Our member Avril would like to share her experience of singing in The Mackintosh Choir.

I've been singing in the Mackintosh Choir since its inception in October 2011. I was one of the founding members and am now its Chair. I was in school choirs and also sang a lot at home, but life got in the way whilst bringing up a family and working. However, I decided to

take the plunge again when my family had flown the nest and have never regretted it for one second. I cannot adequately describe to you the joy there is in lifting your voice with others.

The Mackintosh Choir is an open access, nonaudition community choir based in the Kelvindale area of Glasgow. We rehearse on a Wednesday night and no matter how low or burdened you might be feeling when you arrive, you're guaranteed to leave feeling refreshed, relaxed and happy.

Our repertoire is eclectic

and includes sacred music, secular classical, musical theatre and modern pieces. We perform at two concerts each year, one in June and the other in December. The choir also made regular appearances at the Glasgow Music Festival up until Covid arrived. It came first in the Class for Mixed Choirs at the Festival in 2016 and, in 2019 the choir wiped the board by winning the Class for Mixed Voices, the Class for Male Voice Choirs, the Class for Female Voice Choirs and was awarded the Glasgow Orpheus Choir Trophy Certificate at the Festival in 2019. What a celebration we had that night and for weeks after! In 2015 the choir was highly honoured to be conducted by

the world-renowned composer, John Rutter CBE, as we sang his arrangement of "Feel the Spirit" at our summer concert. We were even more honoured when he agreed to be the choir's Patron.

As well as giving performances on its own, the choir has been invited to join with other Glasgow Choirs for a variety of concerts and performances in the Glasgow City Halls, the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall, the Bandstand in Kelvingrove Park and the Bandstand in Queen's Park in

Glasgow. In 2017, the Choir was invited to give musical support to the National Theatre of Scotland in its production of 'The Submarine Time Machine' in a week of outdoor performances along the towpath of the Forth and Clyde Canal from Spiers Wharf to Firhill Football Stadium in Glasgow. In summer 2020 we would have been joined at our summer concert by The Placer Pops Chorale from California. Unfortunately, this had to be cancelled due to Covid-19. This year we have been invited to sing with the Delaware Women's Chorus as part of West Fest. What a wonderful way to spend one's time.

improving our singing, the choir is also about providing enjoyment and socialising. When asked in a snap survey to describe the experience of being in the choir, the most common words used by choir members were "fun",

Whilst we are passionate about

"friendship", "exhilarating", "life-affirming". We regularly have social evenings as a choir and all sections of the choir have their own social activities.

If you want to hear us, our next concert is on Sunday 18th June at 7pm in St John's-Renfield Church, Beaconsfield Road, Kelvindale and is part of West Fest. The concert, with tickets at the door at only £10, is a lovely mix of classical and popular music including works by Billy Joel and Verdi, and with the soaring harmonies of **Unchained Melody. Something for everyone!**

The group has been very active with another 2 informal monthly gettogethers at Cottiers which are well attended and a great chance to catch up. We have an active WhatsApp Group with lots


of ideas and suggestions of events taking place locally. Regular updates are sent to members not in WhatsApp. Some of the activities that members have taken part in include:
