
17/1/24 Prof David Robertson MRC centre for virus research: "Origins of Covid 19"




Photography

The group normally meets on Mondays. We enjoy a mix of visits to places of historical interest and presentations, both in-person and via Zoom.

Our December event was a presentation on the Cuningar Stones by artist and stone carver, James Winnett (pictured).

These fifteen standing stones, part of a 2015 regeneration project, were recovered from rubble found in the landfill site on Cuningar Loop which is opposite the Athletes' Village on the banks of the Clyde. Much of the rubble came from demolitions in the Gorbals. The carvings represent aspects of the area's history and wildlife. We all loved the talk as James is such an inspirational speaker, clearly committed through his art to representing both ancient and recent social history.

Unfortunately, we have had to cancel our January meeting as our planned speaker has another pressing commitment. Our next meeting will be in February when we'll be having a tour of the Women's Library, Bridgeton. Visit our web page here.

Below is a review by one of our members of our December read, 'Ethel Rosenberg – The Short Life and Great Betrayal of an American Wife and Mother', by Anne Sebba.

"Anti-Soviet paranoia and fear of Communism plus widespread anti-Semitism in the USA ultimately decided the fate of Ethel Rosenberg and her husband Julius. Betrayed by her brother and subjected to a travesty of a trial,

they were executed as spies in 1953. This is an interesting and detailed biography of a talented aspiring woman although the group agreed that if written by an historian rather than a journalist her story would have been better understood set within the wider context of the political and social mores of 40s and 50s USA."

At our meeting on 8 January, we discussed 'Erebus' by Michael Palin. We'll have a review of it in our next newsletter.

Art Appreciation Group 2

Our final visit of 2023 was to the Hunterian Art Gallery, a venue right on our doorstep on University Avenue. Twenty-four of us met up just before Christmas to have a look at some of the newer exhibits and to revisit some old favourites.

Despite an initial mix up about a guide, the wonderful Hunterian staff came to our rescue to explain the concept behind the 'Reframed' theme in the main gallery and to highlight the recently added 'Trembling Museum', an impressive collection of African art. However, the group's favourite collection on this visit was the recently opened 'Stage and Screen: Designs from the James L Gordon Collection'.

This fabulous personal collection showed set and costume designs for British theatre productions from 1900 to 1990, plus British and American designs for film and television from 1930. The works were displayed from floor to ceiling (as in the owners own home apparently) showing the work by leading artists such as Cecil Beaton, David Hockney as well as costume designs for stars like Rudolf Nureyey, Richard Burton, Elizabeth Taylor, Marilyn Munroe and many others. Many of the set designs for performers were identifiable by the inscriptions or drawings, for example, Liza Minelli, Elton John, The Jacksons, Mike Jagger and The Beatles.

This 'surprise' exhibition was a great hit with members and really warranted much more time, with some of us promising to return. At this busy time of the year, some of the group had other commitments, while twelve of us managed to squeeze in a light lunch at the nearby café in the new ARC University building.

This first year of the new art appreciation group 2 has been successful, with planning underway for 2024. Happy New Year to all.

Member of the Month:

My first year as Trustee for Scotland has flown past. The u3a Trust is the umbrella organisation for the u3a. Its purpose is to guide, give advice, support u3as in every way possible, eg risk assessment, insurance, legal matters, finance etc. Beacon, the administrative data system used by gweu3a comes from the Trust using volunteers as does the site builder website. The u3a Trust has 23 full time equivalent staff members based in London. Important start up grants as well as grants for certain activities are produced by the Trust.

As you are aware the u3a has been in existence for 40 plus years and as society changes the movement changes too, certainly in proposed governance. A Pilot Council has been operating in conjunction with the Board in order to see how that works. More information to follow.

Enough of the theory. What do I do? I sit on the Board which meets 4 times a year in London. There are also a number of online Zoom meetings throughout the year dealing with finance etc. I work closely with u3as Scotland which is the Scottish network for u3as. We have been involved in supporting the start-up of Glasgow Southside, organising meetings with Treasurers and hopefully Chairs. Banchory u3a and Isle of Bute were in their infancy when I took over and a number of supportive phone calls and a visit were in order. Scotland is a very big place! There are 54 u3as in Scotland from Shetland to the Borders.

One of my personal aims is to contact all 54 u3as and organise for a chat and to put local groups together in informal groups. So far, I am more than half way there. This has been very rewarding to me. I am struck by how lively u3as are in Scotland as well as how different. Chairs/committee members often email me to ask for advice, to clarify

points etc. My hope is that a supportive group of Networks will be in place.

Of course, I have visited a number face to face e.g. Edinburgh, Lanark, Banchory, Kinross, Glasgow area to name but a few. I had a great chat with the committee of Callender u3a. Geographically it includes many local villages which enhances the activities.

What are the issues with u3as in Scotland? Committee volunteers, group leaders, do we become a Charity? Do we use Beacon? Making the u3a movement known in Scotland.

U3a is UKs best kept secret. How do we make it known? A radio campaign has been suggested. I (along with others in the Trust) are investigating that possibility. Advertising in retirement courses is a possibility too.

What has given me the most satisfaction this year as Trustee?

- 1. Seeing Glasgow Southside u3a up and running and thriving, visiting Banchory and chatting to happy u3a members.
- 2. Supporting the concerned.
- 3. Meeting u3a members who really enjoy being part of the movement.
- 4. Bringing some issues to the attention of the Trust and enabling change to take place.
- 5. Having fun at u3a events.

What next? Continue to ensure I meet as many representatives from u3as as possible.

Be part of starting more u3as where appropriate. Be part of the advertising campaign.

Hopefully that gives you a flavour of my Trustee role. It is about people, listening, communicating, informing where appropriate.
