Chairman's Message

Despite what seems to be endless rain, a few sunny days – even (dare I say it) warm days – heralds Spring's much-yearned arrival. Where I live in Manthorpe there is blossom a-plenty to be seen on the morning dog walk and it's a welcome, cheerful sight.

As you may know, the Committee has been looking at the possibility of organising a Summer Picnic to be held on the day of the August monthly meeting. We put out a survey recently to see which of a few options members would like to participate in, or indeed if they would prefer no event at all. The result of this poll was that, of the (approx.) 40% of the membership that responded, 48% favoured a catered picnic at The Garden Yard (in Union Street next to Lidl), 5% wanted a bring-your-own picnic in Wyndham Park, and 11% expressed an interest in a tour of Farmer Barnes's Dairy in Melton Mowbray. Accordingly, at April's committee meeting, it was agreed we would arrange the event in The Garden Yard. Our intention is to offer the event to members free. It only remains for us to take a poll nearer the date to request (for catering purposes) the numbers of those who will attend on Tuesday August 20th from 3pm. We may take up the Dairy Visit on a different basis on another occasion.

As I mentioned last month, and indeed was stressed at the AGM, our Treasurer (Tony Hine) is due to retire from this role on the Committee at the year's end. It is imperative that we find a replacement for him. Beat the scammers

Over the past few months, we have talked about the many areas where we need to protect ourselves. One thing we haven't covered yet is our car. The costliest tricks are where scammer sell us a fake car (or other valuable items). They often ask for a bank transfer payment to reserve the item for us, sometimes even before we have seen it. Banks generally don't guarantee these transfers.

Scammers also set up fake websites for things like Road Tax Subscription often using very similar website names to the government.

Another common scam is where false QR codes are put on parking payment machines. Scammers stick, in front of the original QR code, a false one which sends our payment and bank details directly to them.

- **Tip 1:** When buying a car (or valuable item), always go and see it first. Ask to see the car ownership document, i.e. the log book (V5C). Also, when selling a car, make sure you have received the money in your bank before signing the car over to the new owner.
- **Tip 2:** QR codes have become a common way to get us to complete a financial transaction. Never accept a QR code which has been sent to you personally and look out for QR codes labels which may cover the original QR code. **Jacob**
