Beat the Scammers

The internet is an amazing system to learn about anything and everything we want to know. How many times have we said: "Let's Google it". Guess what? The scammers also love to use that facility to learn about us! Having done a search on myself recently I was amazed how much information I could find about me and my family. And I am a person who does not share information online, at least I thought so. People use social media to share their life stories, giving scammers the opportunity to start

building a picture of our lives. Scammers start to look for key information we may post so they can appear to know us. After having established an email / phone conversation with us, they subsequently start with questions like: "Can you please confirm . . ."

- **Tip 1:** Whenever we put information online on things like social media, take a few seconds and think if this information is sensitive data. Consider who you are sharing the information with?
- **Tip 2:** When being contacted unexpectedly, let's always ask ourselves the question: "Why?" Scammers will often rush and push us when they start collecting key data. Take a deep breath and if in doubt, terminate the conversation. If there is a genuine issue why we have been contacted, the person or company will contact us again, possibly in writing. **Jacob**

In February we look forward to a new speaker for us, Tom Lane, who will talk on Lincolnshire Customs and Traditions. Tom will be bringing two folk singers (Nigel Creasey and Teri Clark) and as it will be St Valentine's Day he'll be incorporating this into his talk.
