Beat the scammers

Do you also get that feeling that we are not getting any younger? I certainly do even when I am only in my early sixties. Hence I have put a few things in place to make sure that the right decisions are being made for me when I am not able to make these decisions myself. Again, this is an area where we see more activity by the scammers who know that we are becoming easier targets when we are most vulnerable and need help.

Tip 1: When the time is there that we can't take the right decisions for ourselves, would it not be great to already have a contingency in place. To set up Lasting Power of Attorney (www.gov.uk/power-of-attorney) is something most of us can do ourselves, maybe with a little bit of help. There are two types which we are likely to need:

- 1. Property and financial affairs This LPA covers our money and property.
- 2. Health and welfare This one covers our health care and personal welfare.

Tip 2: And yes when the final inevitable day is there, having a Will in place will make sure our money goes to the people we want it to go to and probably need it most. Not having a Will in place makes it much easier for the "Scammers" to get a share of it (and the Government too!). **Jacob**

At the same time, please check your emergency contact details which should be of the form - Name, Mobile number and relationship to you. One thing you can check when looking at your record is whether you are correctly registered in any group to which you believe you belong. You can see all your groups at the bottom of your record. Please make your group leader aware if you do not appear to belong to a particular group. Being properly registered in a

group makes it easy for the Group Leader to contact you by phone or email. All of the above should only need to be done once for everything to work smoothly.


Group News
