Nuffield Health Better Mobility Classes

HEALTH & ACTIVITY TRACKER PILOT

The Health & Activity Tracker pilot is part of a new collaborative project between Surrey Libraries, Active Surrey, SCC IT & Digital, and University of Surrey to introduce a new service to the libraries: Active Surrey began a new partnership with Surrey Libraries in 2022 to provide opportunities in library settings for residents to take part in activities, events and services that will increase/impact their physical activity levels.

Since March 2023 residents living in or near Camberley, **Guildford**, Redhill, Merstham and Redhill Libraries can borrow for FREE (if a library member, if not they can join) a Health & Activity Tracker. The trackers are available to borrow for 6 weeks with an opportunity to renew. The trackers have a whole host of features including sleep and activity tracking, heart rate and stress monitoring, and PAI – personal activity intelligence metric which can help wearers manage their health status. Each library will have 3-4 trackers which are available to loan to adult members. For further information please

RETIREMENT OCCUPATION

The word 'Retirement' means many things to many people. I have been very fortunate in my ability to focus on giving illustrated presentations as a main retirement occupation. Tracing my family history, I ascertained that my grandfather was a cousin to Sir Joseph Lyons (always known as Joe), the co-founder of J Lyons & Co, famous for its Teashops, Corner House restaurants, Swiss Rolls, Cup Cakes, etc.

The family relationship encouraged me to research the company history, which has led to numerous presentations. These cover not only company history but extend to the story of LEO, the world's first commercial computer, designed and manufactured by Lyons and Art in the Lyons Teashops, a post-war project to glamorise the run-down teashops with commissioned lithograph paintings.

I have given more than 200 presentations since the year 2008, advertised only by word of mouth. Audiences have included 46 u3as mainly in S.E. England. Guildford u3a is, of course, among these! The pandemic led me to give successful online talks, which now continue unabated.

Central u3a have recently developed a project, enabling any member to offer talks online, to which all members nationwide can obtain access. In this way I gave the J Lyons company history talk on 23 March and the LEO talk on 16 June.

Pleasingly, there have been spin-offs in the form of invitations to talk online to Exeter u3a and to London Regions u3a, which consist of 43 u3as across London. A more recent development has been an invitation to participate in the u3a Radio Podcast, which consists of monthly episodes covering recorded interviews on any subject of interest. My interview covering matters about the J Lyons history was released on 17 June – see <u>https://www/u3a.org.uk/news/u3a-radio-podcast</u>. The second part of the interview covering the J Lyons story is due for release 17 September.

NEWS FROM THE GROUPS

ENGINEERING GROUP

Whilst many u3a Groups excel at exploring our rich heritage, last week Guildford u3a Engineering Group took a look into the future with a visit to the University of Surrey, touching on communications, automotive design, wind tunnel airflow modelling, and robotics.

The University have the largest academic Communications Systems facility in Europe, complete with its own campus-wide cellphone network, and played a key role in the development of 5G mobile. Be not afraid - 6G is coming, but not just yet. The 5G/6G Innovation Centre is now focussing on setting 6G standards, including for immersive experiences such as virtual and augmented reality for industry and consumers.

The Formula Student Engineering Design Centre were busy preparing their EV racer entry for the 25th international 'Formula Student' event at Silverstone, where all aspects of the design come under intense scrutiny, prior to racing against the clock. Closeness to industry is emphasised with a McLaren chassis hanging on the Centre wall

The Centre for Aerodynamics and Environmental Flow can model fluid flows around bicycles, buildings and much more, key to understanding issues such as wind power and air pollution. Measurements are automated, but It gets a little noisy when the wind tunnels are operating!



demonstrated advances in speech and computer vision with a number of robots including 'Spot' the dog who has an autonomous neural network for a brain, can run, climb stairs and then plug itself in when the batteries get too low. Dogfood not required, just a nice juicy recharge..

JAZZ GROUP

We have enjoyed a great line up of bands this year. The music has been mainly in the trad jazz style from the '20s and '30s New Orleans and Chicago, Dixieland and Tin Pan Alley, but within that there was a wide variety. This has included the repertoires of Stephane Grappelli and Django Reinhardt, Louis Armstrong, Bix Beiderbecke, Chris Barber, Acker Bilk and Jelly Roll Morton and others. Over the concerts we have seen quite a range of instruments being played piano, trumpet, trombone, sousaphone, banjo, clarinet, banjo, etc but also a three-stringed double-bass, and a Stroh violin. And one musician played drums and tuba at the same time!

Band members tell us about the pieces they are playing, something of the lives of the musicians, as well as entertaining stories about their own musical journeys - perhaps when they've met one of these original players. They will often take requests if a member has a favourite piece – for example Fats Waller's *Yer Feet's Too Big* – with very little discussion amongst themselves about how the piece should be played – C? one, two, three – and off they go. Stand-out memorable moments from the year are a vocal rendition of Louis Armstrong's *Winter Wonderland* at the end of our December concert which put us in the mood for Christmas, and a haunting *Somewhere Over The Rainbow* on flute.



We hold six concerts a year from October to April, not in January, in Shalford Village Hall. Admission is £6 for each concert to cover the cost of the band and refreshments. Advance booking is necessary, so that we know beforehand that we've got enough money to pay the band, and that we don't overfill the hall.

TARGET SHOOTING Taster Session – Wed 20 September, 2.00 – 3.30pm

Have you thought you might like to try this sport? Maybe for the first time - or perhaps this is something you did years ago and are feeling 'rusty'. Why not try a Taster Session? This will be held at the Lord Roberts Centre, Bisley, the headquarters of the National Smallbore Rifle Association. No previous experience is necessary – and all equipment is provided.

The 90-minute session will be led by their fully-qualified instructors, with a maximum of three participants per group, giving a high level of individual instruction. The session commences with a full safety briefing, and includes insurance. Two disciplines will be experienced – 10m air rifle and .22 live fire.

The activity is appropriate for people with a disability, and the instructors are particularly good at accommodating these – but please let us know in advance. We have been on the range while the Paralympic team have been practising, which was very interesting to observe.

The Target Shooting Group has been running for a few years now, with sessions each month between October and June. Members progress at their own speed, for example using turning targets and learning how to adjust their own sights, and new disciplines have been experienced when possible, such as cross bows and pistols. New shooters are welcome to join the group and can be accommodated more easily at the start of the year when extra or slower instruction can be given.

The cost of the 90-minute session is £35. This includes – full tuition from qualified instructors on two disciplines, full safety briefing, use of their ranges, all necessary equipment and insurance. Booking in advance is essential so that we are able to have the required number of instructors available.

OUTINGS AND VISITS REPORT

Our trip to the City of London in March showed us how much has changed in the 'square mile' recently, making it almost unrecognisable for those of our members who had worked in the area. Cranes, road works, barriers and signage were everywhere – and neither cars nor buses are allowed in the area during the day. Simon, our driver, was challenged by someone in a hi-viz jacket "You can't bring that down 'ere, mate." But he did! With silent cyclists now the kings of the road (and pavements) we had to be on our guard at all times, but we made it safely into the **Bank of England Museum** for a very interesting visit. We were given an informative presentation on the history and work of the Bank, its role and limitations in advising governments, trying to keep the economy stable by controlling inflation (a topical

subject), and how bank notes are designed and produced to avoid counterfeiting. Our knowledgeable guide answered many questions. We were then free to look around the museum where there were displays of old coinage and notes, explanations of how wealth was created through trade and industry - and a solid gold ingot which we could try to pick up. In keeping with the financial theme, some of us adjourned to the Crosse Keys for some lunch – this 'grandiose' building used to house the Hong Kong and Shanghai Banking Corporation, and many of its features remain such as the counter now used as a bar.

Our afternoon started by venturing high up to the **Sky Garden** for an amazing aerial view of London's impressive skyline – old familiar landmarks like St Paul's are now dwarfed by the new skyscrapers. Some members also visited another newer roof garden which was at only the 15th floor, but open air and a much greener space.

We then had a private tour of **Mansion House** where our entertaining guide showed us around this magnificent building, home to the Lord Mayors of London and used for civic functions. On the day of our visit the staff were preparing for a formal dinner for plumbers in the evening, setting out their robes ready for them to wear, and place settings in the fabulous Egyptian hall. Other rooms included the Salon with its magnificent chandeliers, and down in the underground vaults was a seriously impressive display of gold and silver-ware used on formal occasion – a couple of extra blokes in suits appeared at the back of our group at that time - just in case! Then it was back to the noise of the street again to our waiting coach.

By complete contrast, our visit in April to Milestones Museum was a nostalgic trip down memory lane. We enjoyed having a go on amusement arcade machines in the form of a seaside pier where we tried to dislodge pennies, laughed at ourselves in distorting mirrors and then strolled along cobbled streets with replica shops from Victorian times right up to the 30s and 40s and beyond. There was something for everyone with vintage vehicles and fascinating films of life in bygone years. There were things to see around every corner a pub serving real beer and the customers having an East End sing-along!



We then went on to the **The Vyne**, a National Trust Property for a private visit. This was originally a Tudor house but has had many additions and alterations. Every room was different and had its own style – the blue and white stone entrance hall, the room covered with magnificent tapestries, smaller luxurious bedrooms, a family chapel, the long dark oak-panelled Tudor gallery was directly above the light and bright stone gallery. The house has lovely gardens ideal for a stroll – and a cup of tea!

It was a treat to return to the magnificent **Royal Albert Hall for the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra's Film Music Gala.** A sunny day meant we could enjoy some time in Hyde Park before the concert. The programme included classics such as Harry Potter, E.T., the Good the Bad and the Ugly and also newer pieces from Frozen and Encanto. They were accompanied by a magnificent choir - in some pieces the sound carried up to the rafters! We had excellent seats, a choice of stalls where we were close to the action on the stage, or front circle with an amazing view of the whole auditorium. On Bank Holiday Monday, 6th May, despite rather poor weather, around 20 brave u3a members celebrated **King Charles III's coronation** in the grounds of the Spectrum and we had a great time sharing patriotism together.



In May our visits to Exbury Gardens were a great success. There was such a long waiting list that a second trip was possible. We stopped off in Lymington, in beautiful sunshine, to have coffee by the harbour and looked longingly at the delightful boutique shops



This was followed by going to Exbury Gardens where we had an amazing guide who told us about its history and the de Rothschild family. He kept our attention as we walked around, by telling us tales of the gardens, and how the plants were found and brought here, and how 'Mr Lionel' grew different varieties from seeds. The steam railway was fun and an easy way to look at the gardens where the azaleas were in full bloom. Some members walked further afield around the grounds, to see the house, various statues, and the beach by the river. Some members of course visited the shop!

The visit to Windsor Castle and cruise on the River Thames finally took place in June and was described by one member as "another amazing day out" and by another as "one of the best days out ever". We had a wonderfully relaxing morning on the Thames travelling through Boveney Lock up as far as Bray, past some impressive houses, with an informative commentary and an absolutely delicious ploughman's lunch. A short stroll up to Windsor Castle followed where a very thorough talk was given on the life of Queen Elizabeth II at Windsor Castle. We then went our separate ways to see the highlights of the castle which individuals wanted to focus on – this included the State Rooms, the Doll's House or, as many

wanted to see, the final resting place of the Queen now reunited with her parents and Prince Philip in St George's Chapel.

SOCIAL ANTROPOLOGY VISITS OUTING TO THE HORNIMAN MUSEUM-22nd May

What a lovely outing and well worth a second visit; The Horniman is small, quirky but immensely varied. My first Outing of the year took us right through South West London instead of the boring M 25 with magnificent urban trees, like horse chestnut, in full bloom.

The museum is the private collection of Frederick John Horniman, an affluent tea trader. His collection started in the 1860s, and transpired into a museum in 1901. The museum had originally been the family home, but they had to move out when the collection took over the house! We mostly went off and did our own thing, sometimes meeting up at the pleasant café. Quite a few of us however did spend some time in the **Musical Instrument Gallery.** Not only can you see an extremely wide variation of all kinds of musical instruments but you can watch videos of ethnic performance or how to make a brass instrument and to listen to a wide variety of sounds from the music boards (seated, I add).

The World Gallery has been completely re designed since my last visit arranged in Continents with four interlinked spaces. There is the **Introductory Area, Encounters** showing ways of living, **Perspectives**, with an area which reflects on how and why we categorise, describe and understand the world, and **The Horniman Vision.** It is light and colourful now.

Perhaps we can give the **Natural History Collection** a miss although you must see the stuffed walrus, and unless you wish to re visit childhood museum memories of stuffed animals and many bones (although this is Horniman's own collection and unique) but only because there is much more. **The Aquarium** is extra and so is the **Butterfly House** except that it was closed for the time being. In addition, there are always a variety of other small exhibitions.

Then there is outside. There are pretty gardens and Nature Trails as well as a magnificent panorama of the City part of London. And don't forget the animal enclosure including one very large, white rabbit. And it is all free apart from those mentioned. No need to book or print out vouchers. Just come and go freely. Then if you are really bored, Dulwich Gallery is in easy distance



I made this booking with little warning so many people already had commitments and May was rather a full month. Also nine people had to drop out sadly so, I have decided to re-book for early September but no date yet.

I see that the Young V and A, formerly the Museum of Childhood is re-opening after a total makeover. This might be worth visiting again. Also to marvel how this once 'no go' area called Shoreditch has re invented itself, at a cost. I am still pondering now to get a coachload of
