There are so many subjects for the Climate Change Group to talk about but recently it has been concentrating on the development and use of hydrogen for power. **Pat Jacques**, the Group Leader reports:

"This is very topical just now. There are two problems with hydrogen; it is the smallest atom and difficult to contain, the other is it is unstable in the sense that it is explosive. It can be safely transported by mixing it with ammonia.

"One of the positive outcomes of hydrogen power is that the emissions are water only. I imagine several university departments are working together with industry on the best ways to exploit the benefits of hydrogen. It just has to be the future."
