History of Art







'Once more we are lucky to be meeting fortnightly in the Gracious Street Methodist Church Hall, Knaresborough, to listen to Brian Souter's excellent illustrated lectures on art, 2nd and 4th Wednesdays at 2pm. This time the subject is 'Impressionism', and the first three talks covered the art of Monet, Manet, and Renoir.

Monet's 'Impression Sunrise' (1872), a misty Autumnal view of the harbour at Le Havre, was picked out for derision at the first exhibition in 1874, also Manet's 'Bar at the Folies-Begere' (1881-2), the artists thus becoming known as 'Impressionists'. Renoir's 'The Luncheon of the Boating Party' (1881) (Washington) was shown at the 1882 Impressionist Exhibition. Scenes of 'modern life and the newfound leisure time' replaced history paintings of great deeds and the ancient world.

Talks continue through to April next year, for instance on Pissarro this month, and Degas and Sisley in November.
