

VISIT TO HELMSLEY WALLED GARDEN

It was a cool morning as 26 of us set off from Haxby for Helmsley where we started with a tour of the garden. The walled garden was built in 1756 and provided employment for over 30 staff kept busy providing Duncombe Park House with produce and flowers. A vine house, orchid house and pineapple pits provided the exotica demanded of a fashionable wealthy house of the time.

After the First World War however, many of the employees did not return and a smaller produce garden was created nearer the house. A local farmer rented the walled garden and overlaid the gardens with rows of turnips and potatoes. Eventually he abandoned the garden and it lay untouched for many years until a local, Mrs Ticehurst, pushed open the gates and had a vision of how it may be restored.

Today, the garden features a series of garden rooms and sitting areas. It is managed by volunteers for the HWG Trust, and provides many people with contemplative areas to enjoy or work with nature. The orchard and walls feature fruit trees and vegetables are still grown in abundance. Produce is usually offered for sale at the entrance along with herbs and flowers. The Vine House is now a popular cafe with ample outdoor seating.

After a wander around Helmsley and the necessary ice cream, we enjoyed a scenic drive back via Ampleforth, Wass, Stillington and Huby to Haxby.

YAHR u3a Summer School 2022 25 – 28 July

I attended this year's Summer School held at The Hawkhills, Easingwold which is a lovely 18th century house set in extensive parkland with forest trails.

There were eight members of H&W u3a who joined u3a members from various parts of the region, most of whom stayed in modern residential accommodation onsite although those of us who live locally preferred to go home each day.

We arrived on Monday afternoon for registration and were welcomed in the Conference Room by the Chair of YAHR u3a, Pat Collard. She outlined the programme for the week and called us out in group order to follow our tutor to the allocated classroom. I chose to do the Archaeology of Britain in the post-Roman period, led by a tutor from a previous Summer School, as I knew he would make the course enjoyable although it required immense concentration.

There were fifteen in our group and we had two large screens to show excavation sites and burial mounds and the variety of objects which had been recovered. These included leather shoes, household objects, flint tools and weapons. We had two more full days of instruction and on the Thursday morning each group did a presentation to the other members. There was jewellery making, Spanish, Philosophy, Art, 'The air we breathe', Women artists from the Renaissance period, Greek Mythology and, of course, Archaeology. This was quite light-hearted and very enjoyable.

Coffee, tea, fruit juice, fruit and biscuits were always available and lunch and dinner were provided each day. We could take our drinks onto the terrace or go for a walk in the grounds and the library was available at all times. There was a talk or a quiz each evening for those members who stayed overnight. The location is ideal and it was good to meet up with people I had met at previous summer schools.

Our tutor said he is thinking of offering a different course next year so I am hoping to go back again.



Terry Prebble has done a magnificent job running the Sunday Lunches. He has now decided to step down as Group Leader. He will be an hard act to follow.


Hopefully we will have a new Group Leader by the time we go for our Sunday Lunch in October.
