

Meetings will be held on the 4th Monday of the month at the Heaton Moor United Church at 10.30am. Everyone is welcome.



Everyone is welcome to come to the talks – but booking will be essential for the Jodrell Bank visit.

The Jodrell visit is a joint activity with the Garden and Wildlife group and should allow plenty of time to visit the Scientific Exhibitions and the Arboretum as described below.

Extracts from The Jodrell bank website:

"Jodrell Bank's inspirational story includes revolutionary scientific discoveries, amazing feats of engineering, the dawn of the Space Age and the creation of the Grade I listed Lovell Telescope, an icon for science and engineering.



Today Jodrell Bank Observatory is owned and managed by the University of Manchester and is a worldleading science research institute, with scientists working at the cutting edge of modern astrophysics. In 2019 Jodrell Bank was recognised as a site of Outstanding Universal Value and inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage Site list."

"An arboretum begun by an astronomer who also loved trees: Bernard Lovell. It is on a flat site dominated by a giant radio telescope - a great 'garden ornament' in the tradition of sundials and royal observatories. In addition to the trees, there are National collections of malus and sorbus, with the Heather Society's calluna collection. Chris Beardshaw designed the Galaxy Gardens in 2011, which consists of seven smaller gardens representing the seven key stages in the formation of the galaxy." https://www.gardenvisit.com/gardens/jodrell_bank_arboretum_and_visitor_centre




The History Group meets on the 4th Monday of every month at 2pm in the coffee lounge of the Heaton Moor United Church.
