Their history is commemorated by True's Yard Museum which is housed in old fishermen's cottages. This led to general discussion on the passing of such communities as people become more mobile, acquire second homes or move away from their roots. Comparisons were drawn with our own "Voices of Hickling" following their presentation at our last monthly meeting.



The conditions proved challenging and we struggled in the high, gusting winds to rig the heavily reefed mainsail. Eventually we got settled only to find that the main sheet block was missing, making sail control very difficult. We sailed back to the entrance of the cut but then decided the lack of mainsheet control would make it difficult to get upwind in these conditions. Having failed to row the last section due to the high winds we managed to hitch a lift from a passing motorboat. On describing our adventures to the rest of the group it was decided not to sail in the afternoon as conditions remained challenging.

The August outing is at the Museum of the Broads, Stalham. 4 August coincides with a special steam-sail day. We will be taken by a steam boat to Barton Broad and then sail on the Wherry Falcon around the Broad. This can be booked on-line if interested.

## Wildlife Group: 3<sup>rd</sup> Thursday (10:00 am) Various locations *Chris Foster:*

The July wildlife meeting was held at Foxley Wood near Reepham. Foxley Wood is Norfolk's largest

ancient woodland. Mentioned in the Domesday Book it is now a Norfolk Wildlife Trust nature reserve and home to hundreds of species of wildflowers, birds and insects. The wood is accessed by wide rides with flower verges filling the space.

Vast displays of fleabane attracted huge numbers of butterflies particularly meadow brown, gate keepers, white admiral, speckled wood, ringlet, purple hairstreak and silver-washed fritillary. It proved to be a wonderful morning walk with so much to see and discover. I would recommend this site as a real gem for wildlife and alternatively a mindful stroll.
