HBu3a Committee Monthly Update

On Friday 10th June, 2pm at Hickling Barn, Gareth Davies presented "The Fall of Yarmouth Suspension Bridge". On 2 May 1845 the suspension bridge at Great Yarmouth collapsed killing 78 people, mostly women and children, following a stunt conducted on the river by a visiting circus clown. It was the worst single calamity to befall the town in its history. The talk explored such fundamental issues as: what happened, why did it happen, and could it have been prevented, as well as the legacy of the disaster up to the present day. It was an enjoyable, fact filled and interesting afternoon.

Thank you, as ever, to all our brilliant cake bakers for providing such a smashing selection of home made cakes for our meeting - it really makes the difference and everyone enjoys them so much. Thank you also to to those who pitched in to help with set up and tidy away with the committee being a bit short handed. Bookworms – Reading Group: 1st Wednesday (2:00 – 4:00 pm) various locations *Kathy Cooper:*

Our group met up at Hickling Barn for our monthly get together. The book we discussed was 'The Return of Norah Wells' by Virginia Macgregor which was chosen by Debbie and this is her review:

This month's book focussed on the return of a mother, Norah Wells, who walked out on her family six years previously. It is a concept which raises many questions. Can something like that ever work out well? What makes a mother leave? Why has she come back? Six-year-old Willa was just a baby when her mother left and her elder sister, Ella, has dreamt of her mother's return after being told several untruths. The trouble is that the father, Adam, has moved on. Norah had left Willa in the care of her friend, Fay, for a little while. The little while stretched to six years and now Fay is 'mummy'.

The book wasn't hugely well received by the group. One kept reading, in part, because one hoped for some improvement and to find out how the problem was resolved. Too many side issues caused irritating distractions to the main plot which left it a rather shallow study of a serious topic. Basically a mute topic because nobody wants to entertain the thought that this situation can and does happen. Norah had her reasons for leaving and returning, and when looked at individually seemed plausible. The group collectively gave this book 7/10.

British History

At our June meeting Maureen told us about the occupation of Jersey and the other Channel Islands. Whilst we all knew something of what went on Maureen highlighted the difference between islands with only 6,000 being evacuated from Jersey whilst only 19 people remained on Alderney. She also explained how locals' views of the Germans worsened following their treatment, including the banning of organisations with uniforms (even the Salvation Army and St Johns) and the use of 16000 forced labourers to build fortifications.

This month, on 21st July at 2 p.m. Kaye will lead us with the topic being "The North Enders of Kings Lynn", highlighting the fishing community in this tightly knit but poor area which has recently attracted much attention in the press and a documentary film.

Lastly, an early reminder that our August meeting on 18th will be a visit to the Bridewell Museum in Norwich. This event will be open to both members and non members of the British History Group. It was notable that many of the images that had been enhanced by a post-processing application were stronger as a result. This is not an element of 'cheating', since converting an image to tones of black and white is to immediately falsify what was seen. A suggestion was made that some images were not naturally monochromatic since the POI was the colour detail and this was lost in the conversion. Overall, Sue regarded this as an excellent last thematic presentation as her tenure as Group Leader closed.

Discovering the Broads

This month's trip was on the Wherry Albion which is based near Ludham and operated by the Wherry Trust. Albion is a 124yr old traditional Norfolk Wherry and a very special lady. Known as a "black sailed trader", she is one of only two remaining commercial Wherries built specifically for the Broads. At their peak there were over 300 of these craft, but now Albion is the only one available for hire.

The professional skipper and volunteer crew were extremely friendly and informative and it meant you could either sit back and enjoy the Broads – the wildlife, the boats (Thurne Regatta was on at the time) the people living alongside the Broads and the wonderful skyline – or you could get involved in sailing a heavy, not very manoeuvrable barge that glided most elegantly but took a lot of stopping and or turning. Luckily all the other water users respected our limitations and appreciated we needed half the river at times and a considerable stopping distance. It was a glorious afternoon and when the sea breeze came in quite a breezy one making ideal conditions. Tea and cake and good company made for a wonderful afternoon and a great start to the Platinum Jubilee Celebrations.
