Bookworms – Reading Group: 1st Wednesday (2:00 – 4:00 pm) Hickling Barn *Kathy Cooper:*

Bookworms meet at Hickling Barn on the first Wednesday of the month 2-4pm. Members choose their own book from the library list and the member who chooses the book to be discussed that month will lead the meeting. On 3 May we discussed 'Blood Orange' by Harriet Tyce which was chosen by Judy and this is Judy's review:

"Blood Orange is a psychological thriller written by Harriet Tyce and published in 2019 in the UK.

This debut from Harriet Tyce has it all - a tricky murder case, a complex and conflicted female barrister battling her own demons, and layer upon layer of intrigue right until the unexpected ending. The story centres around Alison, a criminal barrister (also a heavy drinker) who is having an extra-marital affair with Patrick, a colleague. Initially her husband, Carl, seems sensible until Alison's first murder case leads her to see a parallel life to her own. Alison takes on the case of Madeline, a wealthy woman found one morning sitting next to her dead husband, Edwin, and who insists she is guilty of the crime. Carl's true nature simultaneously unfolds as he drugs Alison, spies on her and attempts to discredit her worth as a mother.

The author grew up in Edinburgh and studied English at Oxford University before doing a law conversion course at City University. She practised as a criminal barrister in London for nearly a decade, and recently completed an MA in Creative Writing - Crime Fiction - at the University of East Anglia.

Most of us enjoyed reading this book and a good discussion was held at the meeting talking about the different characters and the storyline. It was given a 7/10."

This month we visited the board walk at Hoveton Great Broad. The only way to get there is via water, so we hired an electric boat from Wroxham and made our way to the reserve. We were met and briefed by a very knowledgeable warden (who rows out everyday) and the walk was full of information boards. We learnt about the £4.5 million project to restore the broad (https://hovetongreatbroad.org.uk/visit-hoveton-great-broad-nature-trail/) biomanipulation, fish tracking and the Daubenton bat and much else. The carr woodland was full of singing birds and also many flowering plants. The atmosphere on the island was very special and we also enjoyed watching the terns nesting on a raft in front of one of the hides.

Open from April-October, the Hoveton Great Broad Nature Trail can be reached by boat and there are free moorings for visitors taking a trip down the River Bure. There is also a passenger ferry.
