The group met up at Hickling Barn on 5 October and we welcomed Keith to the group. We discussed 'The Foundling' by Stacy Halls which was chosen by Jeanne and here is her review:

"Our reading for September was 'The Foundling', the second book by young author Stacy Halls, her first book being 'The Familiars'. 'The Foundling' is an historical fiction based on the Foundling Hospital in Georgian London. The author's research into both the running of the hospital and aspects of living in London during those times for both rich and poor was very thorough and enhanced the storyline with her detail.

At 18, a very innocent Bess gives birth to her illegitimate daughter, lives in an extremely poor household and has no option but to give up her day-old baby to the Foundling Hospital. She saves every spare penny for six years in order to return to the Hospital and reclaim her daughter, only to discover she has already been claimed by a lady impersonating her. As the plot unfolds the lives of Bess and a rich widow collide as Bess discovers the whereabouts of her daughter.

Some of us were intrigued by the history of The Foundling Hospital and did more research, only to discover it is the basis of a 280 year old children's society, Coram, operating to this day to improve the lives of disadvantaged children." We all liked the book and collectively gave it 8/10. Next month we will be discussing "Magpie Murders" by Anthony Horowitz which was chosen by Debbie.
