HBu3a Committee Monthly Update

At our meeting on Friday October 13 Gareth Davies returned to present "Pablo Fangue's Fair and The Victorian Circus". Pablo Fangue was the first recognised Black circus proprietor in Britain and was born in Norwich. Fangue presents an interesting phenomenon by contributing to popular culture over three centuries his own, with regard to the development of circus entertainment in the 19th century; the late 20th century, as the subject of lyrics by John Lennon; the 21st, as an icon of multicultural Britain. The talk used his career to explore the growth of circus as an entertainment form and its contribution to popular culture. It covered the origins of circus and the 'industrialisation' of this form of performance; the circus apprentice system; moral attitudes towards women and children performance in the circus; the role of prejudice, race and entrepreneurism within Victorian society.

Our next meeting is at Hickling Barn at 2pm on Friday 10th November. In a very late change, our speaker will be Stephen Jeffery-Poutler. His talk is entitled "To the Hammer Born: Confessions of an occasional auctioneer". As an auctioneer and online dealer in antiques, vintage items and collectables Stephen describes how the auction business has developed and how the trade operates today. After the presentation we will enjoy, as usual, teas and home made cakes provided by our ever generous members. Thank you to everyone for coming along, we look forward to seeing you there.

Bookworms meet up at Hickling Barn on the first Wednesday of the month 2-4pm. Members choose their own book from the library list and the member who chooses the book to be discussed that month will lead the meeting.

On 4 October the group discussed 'The Fine Art of Invisible Detection' by Robert Goddard which was chosen by me.

Robert Goddard was born in Fareham, Hampshire in 1955 and studied History at Cambridge. He has written in excess of 20 books, his first, 'Past Caring' was published in 1986. He lives in Cornwall with his wife.

'The Fine Art of Invisible Detection' is set between the 1970's and the then present day of 2019. It revolves around five students living in Exeter in 1977, nuclear weapons and the Ban the Bomb movement of that era. 47 year old widow Umiko Wada is a humble secretary to Private Detective, Kodaka. Wada becomes involved in a case that takes her from her home in Tokyo to London, New York, Iceland and the Netherlands where she gets caught up with greed and murder whilst trying to find out who murdered the father of a client. This book created a good discussion although the pronunciation of some of the names became a challenge! There were mixed feelings but overall most of us enjoyed it and gave it 8/10.

HONEY-RUM CHOCOLATE CAKE

INGREDIENTS	METHOD
175g butter	Cream the butter with brown sugar.
175g brown sugar	Add the honey and beat until mixture is light and fluffy.
125g honey	Beat in the eggs one at a time then stir in the rum and
2 eggs	vanilla.
1 tablespoon rum	Sift the cocoa, flour and salt together three times (this helps
1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence	to give a light texture to the finished cake).
2 tablespoons cocoa powder	Fold into the creamed mixture alternately with the sherry,
200g self-raising flour	beginning and ending with flour.
Pinch of salt	Turn into the prepared tin and bake for 45 minutes, or until a
120 ml sweet sherry	fine skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean. 80 deg C,
	350 F, (Gas Mark 4) adjust for fan assisted.
	Allow to cool in the tin for a few minutes then turn out onto a
FILLING	wirerack to cool completely.
	Fill with whipped cream and dust the top with icing sugar.
