Plum Jam recipe

450g (1lb) stoned plums 450g (1lb) sugar Juice of 1 lemon

Put stoned and halved plums into pan with a little water to prevent sticking, and simmer until tender. Add sugar and lemon stirring until sugar is dissolved and then boil to set.

Crab Apple Jelly

Halve crab apples and put into pan with 1pt water to each 1lb of fruit. Simmer until tender then put through a straining bag.

For each pint of strained liquid add 1lb of sugar, 1tbs of lemon juice and 3 cloves. Stir until sugar is dissolved then boil gently to set.

Lastly a report on an event that we don't usually cover, but since it concerns money from your subscriptions that our central u3a organisation spends on your behalf, we thought it might be of interest. It also gives some insight into some of the background work your committee get involved in.

Third Age Trust AGM October 2022

AGMs can be dry and dull affairs. Those for the Third Age Trust (TAT), more usually referred to as National Office, are usually no exception, featuring exciting votes on the appointment of auditors etc.

However, this year's event promised to be different. Notification of the agenda included proposals to increase the annual membership subscription. This forms part of the subscription that we collect from you and is paid to TAT on your behalf by our Treasurer, Steve. This element was increased by about 14% two years ago.

The proposal was to increase this subscription to TAT "from 1 April 2023, and each year thereafter, by an amount based upon the UK's State Pension increase". The accompanying explanation said that the increase was needed to pay for an increased expenditure on "development projects", including raising the profile of u3a and improvements and additions to the services provided. This work required 40% additional paid staff. Also, income was projected to fall as a result of a significant drop in membership over the Covid period.

Your Committee discussed this proposal and formed the view that, at a time when we are all facing big increases in the cost of living, not least on energy and food, it was wholly inappropriate for TAT to be taking these actions and calling for more money from our members. We decided that we would vote against the proposals.

Accordingly, our Chair, Kate, registered to attend the meeting, which was available virtually over a Zoom link.

The meeting was held on 6th October. Kate joined the meeting, sat in front of her iPad in the kitchen, at 10:30. It became clear this was not going to be a quick meeting. Voting on the key funding proposals did not start until after 2pm. Many other u3as such as ourselves also disagreed with TAT's actions, a total of 19 amendments to the 2 funding proposals had been lodged. All had to be voted upon individually. The process took 2 hours!

The summary of the results was that all the amendments, and the 2 original proposals, failed by significant amounts. Votes varied slightly, but generally about 2/3 of the votes were against on each occasion.

Those running TAT were left somewhat stunned. They clearly had not anticipated this outcome and did not have a plan to deal with it. In her closing remarks, the Chair of TAT seemed to acknowledge that they had failed to communicate properly with the membership and need to go away and decide what they had to do next.

A few takeaways from the meeting:

- Those running TAT are hard working, well meaning and genuinely want to improve u3a for the membership.
- They have become disconnected from the needs of their general membership, the silent majority. They know that now and will be taking steps to rectify this.
- They know that they will not be allowed a funding mechanism that has automatic annual increases, be they linked to State Pension, CPI, or any other index. Future increases in subscriptions to TAT will need detailed justification and will be subject to close scrutiny.
