HBu3a Committee Monthly Update

At our meeting on Friday 8th September HBU3A fellow member Mike Flett came to share an informative and detailed presentation about the How Hill Trust - its history and its work in the modern day. We learnt fascinating facts and enjoyed the associated visual presentation. After Mike's talk we socialised and shared, as usual, our lovely home made tea and cake. Many thanks to Mike for taking the time and care to bring us such an enjoyable afternoon, and to our sterling cake bakers for providing such delicious treats! Our next monthly meeting is at Hickling Barn 2:00 pm on Friday October 13 when Gareth Davies will return to present "Pablo Fangue's Fair and The Victorian Circus". Pablo Fanque is the first recognised Black circus proprietor in Britain and was born in Norwich. Fanque presents an interesting phenomenon by contributing to popular culture over three centuries - his own, with regard to the development of circus entertainment in the 19th century; the late 20th century, as the subject of lyrics by John Lennon; the 21st, as an icon of multicultural Britain. This talk uses his career to explore the growth of circus as an entertainment form and its contribution to popular culture. It covers the origins of circus and the 'industrialisation' of this form of performance; the circus apprentice system; moral attitudes towards women and children performance in the circus; the role of prejudice, race and entrepreneurism within Victorian society. This promises to be an informative and thought provoking presentation, after which we will enjoy, as usual, teas and home made cakes provided by our ever generous members. The author leaves the reader to discover how they played a part in each other's lives', some acts were more obvious and others more subtle. Most of us liked this book but it took a second reading by a few of us to get the most from the book as it was intentionally written in a somewhat disjointed fashion. We voted the book 8/10."
