#### The Mona Lisa and a Canal

At the last U3A S&T session, I made an updated presentation of the FALKIRK WHEEL canal lift. A 'Millennium Project to reopen the 1779 Union Navigation from Glasgow to Grangemouth and rejoin it to the Edinburgh canal at Falkirk where a previous eleven 'flight' lock system was unrepairable after forty years of disuse. (Both canals were rendered obsolete/ unusable by the M8 and A80 road schemes; until the 2001 reopening for leisure and water management.) We should all have a passing interest in canals for their strategic and social importance. Dating from the greatest ever canal project, the fifth century BCE 'Yangtze canals and navigation'. Ostensibly completed in the sixteenth century, to controlled the Yellow River flooding and make it navigable for over a thousand mile south, from Beijing to the South China sea. The critical importance of the Suez Canal to British India and French Indo-China, is still crucial in a post colonial world; as graphically demonstrated when a 'Pana-Max' sized contained ship got blown sideways across the canal for a few weeks! The staggering modern engineering feat by the US Corps-of-Engineers, which is the constructed of the Panama Canal, (by first annexing a country and then defeating Malaria); linked both sides of the Americas and the far-East to the European west, much quicker than Marco Polo! (Anyone for the Trans-Siberian Railway ?).

When in Paris, every tourist goes to the Louvre Palace museum and queues to see Leonardo's Mona Lisa; but why is she there? Because an ageing Leonardo da Vinci was invited by the young and enlightened Francis I of France, to reside in southern France and Leonardo always carried the rolled painting in his baggage. Da Vinci was not primarily there to paint but carry out what he was much better known for, as a Civil and Military engineer; (fortifications / docks / canals etc).

Francis I objective was the construction of what is now known as the Canal-du-Midi, to link the Atlantic coast at Bordeaux to the Mediterranean sea; thus circumventing the 'enemy' Iberian Peninsular entirely. Leonardo died in Francis' service four years later and it was the spend-thrift and long lived Louis XIV (Sun King) who finished the job about a hundred years later. But the Mona Lisa belonged to the king, hence his fortress palace of the Louvre became its home; in the royal apartments. There has been years of speculation about the painting's origin and whether it was a work -in-progress, until someone asked Sigmund Freud for an opinion. Freud said "it is Leonardo's portrait of his MOTHER hence it went everywhere with him". (end of story).
