My Irish grandmother, an avid reader of tea leaves, bemoaned the arrival of tea bags. "How can we prepare for disasters if we don't know they are going to happen?" she cried. She always used loose tea leaves, no tea strainer, and eyed my mother's caddy of tea bags as if it were Pandora's box, full of the evils of the world. Could tea bags possibly be responsible for climate change, floods and fires or even the hole in the ozone layer? Well, there's a thought! If you believed grandmother, it was certainly a possibility.

Her whole life had been ruled by signs and superstitions. She claimed she had once seen a banshee who had put a curse on her but she was saved by the finding of a very rare four leafed shamrock. Her weather predictions were second only to those of the Met Office; who needed satellites when one had only to use one's eyes?
