### Merseyside Sight Loss Council

You may remember Jules Lee writing about the new Merseyrail trains she had inspected on behalf of The Merseyside Sight Loss Council back in October 2021. I recently asked Jules to write more about the volunteer work she does for this organisation. I think you will be fascinated to read more about the work undertaken by this great team.

**International Volunteer Day on Monday 5<sup>th</sup> December is a special day for us to recognise and promote the work of volunteers.** It is also an opportune time for me to share with you some details about my volunteering work for the Merseyside Sight Loss Council. It is a truly rewarding and fun part of my life since I retired from employment. I have made some lovely new friends and

have been able to combine my work and live experience to good use for the benefit of others.

All Sight Loss Councils are made up of volunteers who are blind or partially sighted and our role is to tackle local isssues: you may remember a piece I wrote about accessibility testing the new Merseyrail train stock in a previous Newsletter. When the new trains are in situ, our network will be the most accessible across the



country. Groups such as the Sight Loss Council played an important role in designing the new impoved train stock. *(above: Jules with Steve Rotherham and some other members of the Team)* 

Every project we become involved in aims to make a positive impact for blind and partially sighted people. Currently we are working on projects to improve access to Hospital outpatient services at The Royal Liverpool University Hospital, as well as retail and leisure facilities. We have been able to speak directly with M.Ps, Peers at the Houses of Parliament, and closer to home our Metro Mayor Steve Rotherham and retailers at the Croft Retail Park in Bromborough.



I was honoured to be recognised for a prestigious award at the Annual Sight Loss Council recently. I was named as the National Volunteer of the Year. I am also very pleased to say that the Merseyside Team were recognised with the Team of the Year Award. I know I am not unique in volunteering but I do want to stress how personally rewarding it has been. Please think about giving up some of your time, it could build

your confidence by giving you the chance to try something new, have fun, and build a real sense of achievement locally. (*above: Jules being presented with her award*)



We recently held a most enjoyable coffee morning for our Group Leaders. It was so good to get together and share information.



During the morning Mike Waring gave a demonstration of Beacon which was helpful, and the leaders of groups which are presently full agreed to keep their own 'waiting list'. Therefore, if you wish to join a group which is presently listed as being 'full' please contact the leader of the group and ask him/her to contact you if a place becomes available.

We did enjoy the morning but were dismayed to hear Group leaders complain about the problems some of their members cause them. You may be surprised, but here are a few examples.

 Group members who do not let them know that they do not intend to attend a meeting. They simply 'don't turn up'. The rest of group are often waiting for these people. Yes, it is bad-mannered and disrespectful to the Group leader. Your Group Leader makes a commitment *to you*, makes arrangements in advance, and *never* misses a meeting without alternative arrangements. The least a group member can do is email or phone in advance to give apologies.

We reminded the leaders of U3A policy that states that if a group member misses 3 meetings without notice then that person should be asked to leave the group. The Groups team and the Committee fully support the Group Leader in this and will step in to enforce this.

• Another complaint was that the closure of Monte Carlo Restaurant has forced some group leaders to find an alternative venue for their meetings. The Group leaders have put in their time and efforts researching the various venues. They found suitable venues but they are not free.

To ensure that they can cover the rent Group leaders are advised to collect the money for the rent of the venue from all the group members in advance. Usually between 6 and 10 months in advance. For example, a monthly rental of £15 per session would cost £90 for 6 sessions. This amount should then be divided by the number in the group and paid in advance to the Group leader. This works perfectly well with the majority of groups and group members ... however some members refuse to pay because they either expect group meetings to be free of charge or 'they go on holiday' and think that they can 'pay as they go'.

This is not fair to the rest of the group and could leave the Group Leader without funds to pay the rental, therefore the Group Leader is at liberty to ask these members to leave the group if they cannot agree.

Our Group leaders are very important to us and it is good for them to have an opportunity to discuss their problems. The Groups Team will give them all the help and support they can. Groups are the backbone of our U3A and we all need to play our part in ensuring they run smoothly.



Most Groups support and appreciate their Group Leader. It is sad to hear of those who don't. However the next page brings happier news from the Gardening and Cycling Groups.
