The Wreck of the Richard Montgomery Colin Harvey

Just in case you didn't know, there's a wartime wreck with more than 1,400 tons of explosives on board lying less than 200 yards from a busy shipping lane north of the Isle of Sheppey.



The SS Richard Montgomery was an American Liberty ship which ran aground and broke its back on a sandbank in the Thames Estuary between Sheppey and Southend on 20th August 1944. The vessel was on its way to the French port of Cherbourg, which had only just been recaptured by the Allies.

For nearly 80 years, there has been speculation about what might happen if the Richard Montgomery's lethal cargo of bombs and ammunition blew up. It has been variously dubbed the "Doomsday Vessel" or the "Timebomb Ship" and the subject of numerous media features, TV dramas and documentaries.

But eight decades later, the Richard Montgomery - and the Isle of Sheppey - are both still here!

Local historian Colin Harvey, the author of a book and a documentary about the Richard Montgomery, is the speaker at our April meeting. What he doesn't know about Sheppey's "famous" – or should that be infamous- ship isn't worth knowing.

David's Slice of Life

Something slightly different this month. With summer (hopefully) approaching, I thought I'd write four short pieces with a Sheppey beach theme, as I've lived most of my life close to them and, for around 15 years, the sea was virtually on my doorstep at my parents' home in Marine Parade, Sheerness.

1) On February 27th, a couple of days after a severe storm, we went for a walk with some friends along the beach at the Leas, Minster. I was shocked at the huge amount of rubbish washed ashore – enough tree trunks for a small forest, masses of plastic and just about anything else you care to name. It looked like a Mission Impossible clean-up. But, just two days later, a team of 48 volunteers was in action, removing 119 bags of rubbish weighing 119kg. They were out in force again, at The Leas on March 14th and in Sheerness a couple of weeks later, as well as Leysdown and Eastchurch, the latter to clear up the residue of rubbish which had washed ashore after illegal dumping. Full marks to all these volunteers, and to the



Medway Swale Estuary Partnership Group, which organises some of the clean-ups. Most of us are guilty of taking Sheppey's beautiful beaches for granted. But without the hard work of ALL the volunteers from the various groups which participate in the rubbish clearance, our beaches would be unwelcoming to say the least. Incidentally, it was interesting to read on Facebook that the Sheerness branches of Tesco and McDonald's are joining forces on May 13th for a beach clean-up. Full marks, too, to all the staff involved for doing their bit, especially to those from McDonald's, not least because their company (or rather its customers) was named as the UK's second worst packaging polluter in a survey last year.

- 2) Next, a couple of pleas to Swale Council: Firstly, do more (they couldn't do less!) to enforce the rules concerning dogs on beaches during the summer. Man's best friend is not allowed on the beach at The Leas from May 1st-September 30th when this popular spot is packed with families and young children. These rules are often ignored, either through ignorance or deliberately, even though there is a £100 penalty. Secondly, and as soon as possible, the council must start charging the owners of all the camper vans and caravans parked 24/7 along the Shingle Beach between Sheerness and The Leas. The area has now turned into a permanent camp site, mostly by people who do not live locally. It has become a real eyesore.
- 3) Turning back the clock, 60 years ago the beach at Sheerness was the responsibility of a retired lieutenant colonel, an employee of Sheerness Urban District Council, whose rather authoritarian-sounding job title was "Sea Front Controller." I interviewed him a few times in my very early days as a trainee journalist. Decades later, when I thought back to the lieutenant colonel and Sheerness seafront, I could never get The Fat Controller and Thomas the Tank Engine out of my mind! But I don't think the Sea Front Controller ever had to do much controlling or launch a military operation to keep the locals in check. Vandalism and anti-social behaviour were virtually non-existent. Sadly, our seafront and beach amenities now seem to hold a special attraction for Sheppey's increasing number of mindless yobs intent on criminal damage.
- 4) And, finally, just to demonstrate that I don't just hurl brickbats at local authorities, full marks to Swale Council for doing its best to brighten up the sea fronts at Sheerness and Minster Leas, where the beaches are proudly flying the prestigious Blue Flag award. Together with Leysdown, they have also received awards from the Keep Britain Tidy organisation. Plaudits, too, to Sheerness Town Council for the new "Welcome To Sheerness" sign opposite the town's railway station, an addition which makes the approach to the seafront considerably more vibrant than it has been since the hey-days of Sheerness beach and promenade in the 50s and 60s.

THEIR FINEST HOUR

"What did you do in the War, Daddy?"

This question, which was imagined to be on the lips of many baby-boomers during the late forties and fifties, is now filling the minds of Oxford University. They have linked up with the u3a, not only to learn what Daddy did, but also all of the family who experienced the 2nd World War. The results of this research project will be recorded and available on the internet for all to see nationwide from 6th June 2024. This date was chosen to commemorate the Centenary of D-Day.

The Isle of Sheppey u3a wanted to play an active part in this project, so our members were asked, through our Social History Group, to dig out their family wartime stories for others to share. The project is called "Their Finest Hour" and so it turned out to be, although the response from members was disappointing in terms of member numbers involved. Nevertheless, what it lacked in quantity it compensated for in stories of humour, pathos, courage and dogged determination to carry on regardless in very stressful times.

Among the varied stories, we heard of Christine Woodard's grandfather, found approaching his sister's house "...wearing his pyjamas and slippers and over this his black coat and bowler hat. He was pushing his bicycle and attached to the bicycle was the family dog." This paints a humorous picture until one learns that Granddad's house had just been obliterated in the Blitz and that what he had with him was everything he now possessed.

Peter Bury told us how his father had spent the night in the sea, on the beaches of Dunkirk awaiting evacuation, holding his rifle above his head, to keep it in working order. If he failed, or lost his rifle, he would be put on a charge. In the morning his rifle was still working, but he could not move his arms to use it! In the 'Hell on Earth' that was Dunkirk such personal dramas were being played out in their thousands among the participants.

Closer to home, Frederick Goodin had got on his bike to volunteer for the RAF, but he was against a strong headwind, so he had stopped at the first available recruiting office. He had just joined the London Irish Regiment. His wife was not amused!

Betty Allsworth's father and great uncle were in the Royal Navy throughout the war. Betty's mother and great aunt were to be the recipients of a major understatement of the war when they received letters telling them "...not to be concerned if they heard nothing from their husbands for a few weeks, as they may be at sea." It was the D-Day Landings. Betty's father went on to win the DSO off the coast of Normandy.

Even closer to home, the wartime police, at Queenborough, received reports of unidentified signals at Harty Ferry. Was this an enemy vessel or agents in the Swale? Our intrepid local policeman was driven out to Harty in one of the few cars on the Island – it would have been a long way for him to pedal – only to find it was our own troops on either side of the Swale chatting. After the policeman's visit the signals stopped!

In Sheerness, Norman Shaw was saying goodnight to his sweetheart, Iris, when shrapnel from an overhead aerial dogfight passed through her arm. A week later she was allowed home from hospital. Norman, however, survived the D-Day landings and the fight into Germany without any war wounds. They celebrated their diamond wedding and Iris has recently achieved her 100th birthday.

Also, very close to home are the stories of our contributors' own wartime experiences of the evacuation of children from this afflicted corner of the country. From between the lines one can picture their total bewilderment at what was happening to them in this suddenly alienated world that was the 1940s.

These stories of everyday people have been brought back to life, as this project intended, and preserved for all to read and learn from. These are just our local contributions to a nationwide project, but it illustrates that those wartime years truly were "Their Finest Hour" and worthy of preservation.


