Whatever happened to Penny for the Guy?

I doubt that these days youngsters could be bothered to make a guy, even if they knew it was supposed to be an effigy of Guy Fawkes to place on top of their back garden bonfire, always assuming they had one.

I'd love to conduct a straw poll with a bunch of 10-year-olds and ask them who Guy Fawkes was and what he was famous (or infamous) for. I think I can guess the accuracy of the responses.

Anyway, that time of the year is approaching fast. Bonfire Night, Fireworks Night, Guy Fawkes' Night – call it whatever you like but it's just around the corner.



When I was a youngster, 65 years ago, organised firework displays did not exist. If you were lucky enough to have a garden, a small bonfire would be built at the bottom and a box of fireworks, still comparatively cheap then, would be unveiled by dad in almost theatrical fashion just before he lit the bonfire. Studying the contents of the box was all part of the fun, as was scrounging bits of wood for the bonfire and some of dad's old clothes and a load of old newspapers and straw to make the guy.

Thirty years on from my childhood, organised displays were still relatively rare as our children were growing up. That same sense of excitement was still there as they went through the identical ritual of examining the box of fireworks. As the bonfire began to burn, I would attempt to explain which firework I was lighting and what it was about to do – or not do in some cases!

There were just as many pets - especially dogs - around then, but far fewer fireworks, far less irresponsible behaviour and few, if any, complaints about distressed animals.

What a difference three decades have made.

Today, fireworks have become big business. There are pop-up shops and roadside stalls exclusively devoted to selling fireworks for weeks before November 5th. It's no surprise, then, that the number of complaints about the distress caused to pets by fireworks being let off in back gardens and elsewhere has increased massively.

I know that most pet owners hate fireworks, which is one compelling argument against "private" fireworks displays in urban areas. But there is a counter argument, in that responsibly-organised one-off back garden displays held on November 5th are not really the problem. The problem is that with the increased availability of fireworks over much longer periods than was previously the case there has been a huge increase in irresponsible and anti-social behaviour involving them.

Some idiots now let off fireworks any time, on any night, between October and New Year's Eve to celebrate virtually anything you care to name without a thought as to how their neighbours or their pets might be affected. It is this large-scale, regularly repeated selfish behaviour which irritates people and stresses out their pets.

I never have liked being railroaded into "organised" events, especially firework displays. Carefully managed, a back garden display on November 5th or as close as possible, causes but minor noise and inconvenience compared to the almost nightly fireworks bangs and crashes which afflict most communities these days.

Yes, organised displays have bigger, noisier and more spectacular fireworks but there is a lot less fun watching an anonymous person let off an anonymous firework in an anonymous field or park.

Last year, sometime around November 5th, we had a visit from two of our grandchildren. I bought a box of low-noise fireworks from Aldi and let them off at the bottom of our garden. Hardly any noise and no bonfire. It was great fun. No complaints from anyone.

Sadly, I fear that the days of such responsibly-run family gatherings are numbered, firstly because the thoughtless minority have ruined it for those of us who do not like organised displays and secondly because the cost of even the smallest box of fireworks is now horrendous.

Over the course of three generations, we have descended from a situation in which fireworks were let off on only one day each year to the point where they are now let off on every other day in the last three months of the year.

Surely, the sense of fun and wonder vanishes when any special day is repeated so many times it is no longer special.

Their Finest Hour On-line Archive will be published online and made freely available via <u>theirfinesthour.org</u> website. It is expected to be published on 6 June 2024.

Their Finest Hour is a nationwide project organised by Oxford University. It aims to record, for posterity, those memories handed down in families, of life during and after the events of 1939-1945. You don't need to have been there, but maybe your family talked about 'the war'. Maybe you have snapshots, or objects, that have significance in your family. Your family memories may be from military life or may be based in home life or in working life, but all are valued.
