Speaker report

Wildlife Photography- Len Shepherd

Yet another well-attended meeting where extra chairs had to be unfolded! What a supportive community we are.

Len opened his presentation with a photo of his bicycle in the snow that he took 18 years ago. His reason? To share his observation that he has seen very little snow since! Observations recorded as photographs. His second slide was that of a Moon rainbow above Swaledale, which very few members of the audience had ever witnessed. Science recorded in a photo. A photo of striations in sand and stone formed an interesting background to bladderwrack seaweed on the beach. Art as a photo.

Capturing wildlife is a question of where to go and when. A redpoll and a siskin, for example, in a winter photo because you wouldn't see these in summer. And to photograph gannets successfully at Flamborough Head, you need a north-east wind for them to hang above the cliffs. Close-up shots were admired of an arctic term with a single sand eel in its beak, a herring gull with a ... herring and a male kingfisher capturing a fish and a puffin with seven sand-eels.

Question! Is it a T.T.T? Too tatty to take? Only the photographer can decide that. Examples shared were a newly-emerged orange tip butterfly, a brimstone butterfly and two blue butterflies back to back. And where do butterflies go when it's raining, he asked us? in the long grass. Nearer to home, in Glebe Field Wensley between June and August, you may find an Adder's tongue fern so-named because the tall stalk that bears its spores is thought to resemble a snake's tongue. It's an indicator of ancient meadows. Len advised that if you find one, put a stick in the ground to record the location.

Another question... why do cowboys wear leather trousers? Cacti flowers!

Len's photography was admired by a very appreciative audience.

How British Imperialism Shaped the World was the topic discussed on Friday the 8^{th of} April.

In 1913 the British Empire had control of 23% of the world population, peaked in 1920 to 24% that equated to 412 million people and covered 24% of the land mass, but we were not the only country seeking power and influence. BIRD GROUP

After the continuous heavy rain yesterday I did wonder if our outing would be called off. We were lucky that although it was a very dull day it stayed dry for our visit to another new reserve for me: this time at Bolton-on-Swale. I think it is an old gravel pit, and had a good path running along one side, but no access to the far side We were lucky that our group leader and a local volunteer got there early and checked the first hide as it had been ill used over the weekend and literally needed swilling out.

There were several bird feeders with a variety of contents to one side which attracted many different small birds, as did the reed beds between us and the lake. In the first half an hour alone over 20 different birds had been identified. Out on the water were golden eyes doing courtship displays, geese honking noisily, swans gliding gracefully and great crested grebes diving - to name but a few.

We spent quite a lot of time there before moving on to the second hide which wasn't enclosed but did have some benches. To the delight of everyone a pair of kingfishers flew swiftly across just in front of us and a little later flew back again. A welcome dash of colour on a grey day.

We were becoming aware of how cold it was so most of us decided to get back to our cars and drive about half a mile to the new carpark at Scorton Ponds. These are privately owned, rather than being reserves, and at the moment public access is allowed - as are dogs. So it is a popular area for birders and dog walkers alike.

Altogether 43 different birds were recorded including gadwall, teal, a little egret, a heron, tree sparrows, reed buntings, long tailed tits, marsh tits, oyster catchers, goosanders and a sparrow hawk. It proved a most rewarding way to spend a dull morning and more than lived up to our expectations.

Our visit in April will be to Fairburn Ings. No previous experience is needed to join our group as we all have to start somewhere spotting birds and plenty of help in identification is on hand. Binoculars are useful but some of the group bring even better equipment which they kindly invite us to use. We also car share so you don't have to find a reserve you haven't been to. Just contact Gaynor and she will try to arrange a lift
